#### ご挨拶

東京経済大学は、今年創立九十周年を迎えました。この「ローダデール伯文庫」と「三橋文庫」の展示会及び目録の作成は、それを記念する事業のひとつとして企画されました。 両文庫とも、最近本学図書館に収蔵された特色ある個人コレクションです。

「ローダデール伯文庫」は、英国の名門貴族の出身で、政治家でもあり、またアダム・スミスと同時代の経済学者、とくにスミスの経済理論を最初に批判した人としても知られている第八代ローダデール伯爵の蔵書で、その全部ではありませんが、その中の経済関係文献の主要部分が本学の入手するところとなったと推定されております。伯爵自身の書き込みのある文献も少なくありません。

「三橋文庫」は、本学の母体である大倉商業学校の出身者で、長年東京神田で古書店明 治堂を経営した故三橋猛雄氏が、家業の傍ら営々として収集した数千点にのぼる明治前期 の刊行物です。彼はそれについて詳細な文献目録を作成し、出版しております。

これらは先人から受け継いだ貴重な文化遺産であり、広く活用さるべきでありますが、それには今後長い時間をかけて整理することが必要です。そこで創立九十周年という機会を借りてその内容をとりあえず紹介することにした次第です。なお、今年は議会開設百周年にも当たりますので、「三橋文庫」とも関係が深い「五日市憲法草案」(本学図書館所蔵)も展示品に加えました。

今回の展示と目録が、御覧いただく皆様に何程かお役に立ちますことを、心から希って おります。




172. ネッケル, J. 1732-1804 『財政報告書』1781


232. 『南海会社株式第3回公募後の現況』 1720


276. ルイス, M. fl. 1678 『銀行設立提案』 〔1678?〕

この初期信用論著作ないし銀行設立提案は 需要の経済学者・信用論者だった所蔵者の関 心をひかずにはいなかったはずである。




368. [ポレクスフェン, J.] fl. 1675-1697 『イングランドの製造品と東イン ドの製造品は両立せず』1697

保護主義からの代表的な東インド貿易反対 論。ただしその議論では主役は絹であってキャリコではない。本書は重複所蔵されている。




711. リルバーン, J. 1614?-1657 『イン グランド人民の基本的自由の復興』 1649


846. 『減債基金論』1810

長い歴史をもつ減債基金が1793年以降の戦 争で新局面を迎えたときの批判的文献。所蔵 者自身の基金観に近い。




991. 〔チャイルド, Sir J.〕1630-1699 『交易と利子についての若干の考察』 1668


1077. 〔ラウンズ, W.〕1652-1724 『貨幣改鋳論』1695

## ローダデール伯爵と その文庫について

杉 山 忠 平 (東京経済大学教授)

第8代ローダデール伯ジェイムズ・メイトランド(1759-1839)はエディンバラで第7代ローダデール伯の次男として生まれ、エディンバラ大学を経て、オクスフォード大学のトリニティ・カレッジで一学期学んだのち、グラスゴウ大学に移った。グラスゴウではアダム・スミスの高弟であるジョン・ミラー教授のもとで学んだ。その意味では彼はスミスの孫弟子にあたる。しかしこのことは後述のようにスミス経済学にたいする、彼の批判的態度を妨げるものではなかった。ついで彼は名門法学院の一つリンカンズ・インで3年間学び、1780年にスコットランド弁護士会会員の資格を取得した。

同年の総選挙で南西イングランドの一選挙区から下院議員に当選し、バークの財政改革 法案、フォックスのアメリカ和平動議、フォックスの東インド法案などを支持した。1784 年の総選挙でもおなじくイングランドの他選挙区から再選、ヘイスティングズ弾劾委員会 に参加するなど、ウィッグ派議員として活躍した。1789年父の死によって家督をつぎ、第 8代ローダデール伯となり、翌90年、スコットランドを代表する上院議員となった。

上院議員としても彼は対フランス干渉戦争への反対、人身保護律停止法案への反対等、 政権党への反対活動に挺身した。そのため1796年、1802年とつづけてスコットランド代表 上院議員に任じられなかったが、ウィッグ政権の成立によって、1806年恒久的に上院議員 の地位を得ることになった。

同年枢密院委員となり、またヤーマス伯フランシス・シーモアとともに対仏和平交渉の全権委員ともなった。そして政権交替とともにふたたび野党陣営の指導的メンバーとして活躍した。1821年にはアザミ勲章を贈られたが、やがて政見を変え、トーリーに転じた。しかし選挙法改正法案への反対投票を別とし、晩年は目立った政治活動をせず、むしろサールステイン・カースルなる自邸に陰棲し、農事への年来の関心に没頭した。

以上の経歴が示すように、彼はさまざまな現実問題と積極的にかかわりながら、主著『公富の性質と起源についての一研究』(1804)のほか、諸種の主題について約20点にものぼる著作をのこした。

主著の書名が示唆するであろうように、同書で富や価値の要因といった基本的な問題についてスミスの『国富論』に異を唱えて、いわば最初の公然たるスミス批判者となったばかりでなく、その他多くの論点でスミス以降の主流的学説にたいして異端的な議論を展開し、従来とかく忘れられた経済学者の位置におかれがちであった。経済学者としての彼の再評価の機運は比較的近年のことに属するといってよい。

彼の再評価は、蔵書家としての側面においても、にわかに要請されるところとなった。 これまですぐれた経済学者のすぐれた個人蔵書としては、一橋大学のメンガー文庫、同大 学とハーヴァード大学のシュムペーター文庫、千葉商大や名古屋商大のハロッド文庫、ケ ンブリッジ大学のケインズ文庫等がよく知られているが、古典的時代のものの個人蔵書と しては、ローダデール文庫は、量的にいっても質的にいっても、他に類例をみないといっ てよい。

その一部が東京大学にあるアダム・スミス文庫の全貌は水田洋教授の徹底的な調査によって知られるようになっており(Hiroshi Mizuta, *Adam Smith Library*, Cambridge, 1967)、その一層の完全化の努力の成果の近刊も期待されているが、そこに含まれる経済・政治文献は意外に多くない。

スミスとほぼ同時代人であるジョウゼフ・マッシーも多産な著作家であるとともに蔵書家でもあったが、またその蔵書内容がスミス蔵書とことなり、経済文献に集中している点で希有のものであるが、蔵書自体は完全に散逸して、その全容は大英図書館所蔵の自作蔵書目録によって察するほかはない。(ちなみに、マッシー自身の著作にも散逸したものが少くなく、なかには大英図書館やゴールドスミス文庫やクレス文庫にもなくて、ローダデール蔵書中にあるものも数点ある。)

同じくスミスとほぼ同時代人であるフランスのチュルゴの蔵書についても、同様のことがいえる。蔵書自体は本人の死後競売に付されて完全に四散し、その全容はいまでは自作の手稿目録によって推察しうるにすぎない。(なお、同目録にもとづいて蔵書内容を再構築し、それによって蔵書主の思想を探る手がかりを提供した津田内匠教授の成果《「チュルゴの蔵書目録』、一橋大学、1974》が参照されるべきである。)

これらの点にてらしてみるとき、ローダデール文庫は、その内容が経済・政治文献に集中し、しかも古典的時代のものであり、何よりもその厖大な現物が散逸を免れて現存している点で、おそらく空前にして絶後といってよいであろう。自作の手稿目録の入手も期待され、ここに早稲田大学図書館にすでに収蔵された'Political Tracts'と題されている諸巻と合わせて、目録と実物と両々備わった希有のコレクションをなすことであろう。

ローダデールがアダム・スミスの経済思想の影響をうけつつも、これを批判的に越えようとした人で、明白にその直接的批判を意図したのがとりわけ彼の主著であることは、さきにもふれたとおりであるが、そうした経済学者としての識見と、そしてこれまた先述したような当代一流の貴族政治家としての活動範囲と資力とによって収集されたのが本文庫である。手稿目録とともに追加入手が期待される大量の自筆書きこみつき『国富論』は、本文庫の偉容をさらに加えることであろう。

また、とくに彼の関心の深かった財政、金融、貿易、通貨、信用、産業等についての貴重な文献の豊富さは瞠目に値する。彼の経歴と造詣とによって裏づけられる英仏関係文献

もまた圧巻である。その他アフリカ貿易、インド貿易などについても、貴重経済書所蔵館 として知られる諸図書館ないしコレクションにも所蔵のないものが多々あり、今後の利用 に多大な貢献をなすであろうことには、疑問の余地がない。

以上のようなものとしてのローダデール伯旧蔵書は、おそらく所蔵者の没後に現状のようなものとして合本され、事実は厖大な点数であるものが、部厚な若干巻数のものにまとめられている。合本過程で原本の装幀やサイズが原状をとどめないこととなり、そのためそれぞれの物的価値を大いに減ずる結果となったことは否定できない。この蔵書がもっぱらその資料的・学術的価値によってのみ評価されるべきであることもそこに起因する。それだけに、合本によって各資料の利用上将来に残された問題にたいする長期的・本格的な対応の努力が必要であろう。

同時に、すでに国内的・国際的関心を集めつつある蔵書内容について、必要最小限の情報を記載した蔵書目録を可及的すみやかに作製し公刊することが、あらたに所蔵者となった者に課された責務であることも、銘記されねばならないであろう。




