LONDON, November 17.

Since our last arrived two French, and two Holland MALES.

WE have received an Account, that the Marquis de Lede, who commands in chief the King of Spain's Forces appointed for the Expedition against Barbary, arrived at the Camp near St. Roque on the 7th, and the same Day wrote the following Letter to Major Elrington, then Commander of the Garrison of Gibraltar.

SIR, St. Roque, October 13, 1723. As the Troops which arrived yesterday at the Algeciras, with the Gallies of the King my Master, and those which are to come thither with his Ships, as also those which are expected by Land, might possibly give you some Umbrage, I have the Honour, Sir, to write to you, to assure you, that all these Motions ought to give you no Manner of Uneasiness, because those Troops are not designed for any Undertaking that is contrary to the Quadruple Alliance. This, Sir, I can assure you of, since it is I who have the Honour to command them. I take with Pleasure this Occasion to offer you my Services here, and have the Honour to be, SIR,

Gibraltar, October 24. O. S.

The Marquis de Lede having drawn together a considerable Body of Spanish Forces, on the North Side of the Bay of Gibraltar, and having ordered thither three Men of War, six Gallies, and a great many Sarcas, Tartanes, and such like Vessels for transporting them, sent off those Transports to Ceuta, with a good Number of those Troops as fast as they could be embarked, without Convoy; and on the Return of the Vessels, dispatched them with more. He has also sent over a great Number of Matons and other Artificers, great Quantities of Mortar for Malons Work, Stores for Magazines of all Sorts, and several large Ships laden with Water. The said Marquis having received yesterday Part of the Troops that were embarked at Cadiz, went himself on board this Day for Ceuta.

Wafara, Nov. 5.

The Affairs of the Diet continue much in the same Train as formerly, many of the Deputies still refusing to proceed to an Election of a new Marechal, till the Point relating to the Command of the Troops is determined in favour of the Crown-General.

Geneva, November 9.

On the 29th past, the Town of Meyenfelt, in the Country of the Grisons, was burnt down by Accident. The Plague having, in a Manner, ceased in France, they have sung Te Deum at Turin, for having escaped it, and will shortly do the like at Lyons.

Barcelona, November 5.

On the 7th Instant, an Express arrived from Madrid, with Dispatches to the Governour of this Place, who the next Day, sent Orders to all the Commanders in chief of the Troops in this Province, to cause them to repair without Delay, under the Cannon of this City.

Hague, Nov. 22.

They write from Copenhagen, That Admiral Norris sail'd from the Sound the 14th, and that Capt. Watts and 8 of his Boats Crew, endeavouring to go on board by Night in their Challop, it over-set, and they were all drown'd. Letters from France confirm the Ceasing of the Plague in Provence.

Paris, Nov. 23.

Upon a Representation made, by the Parliament, that they could not be removed more than 16 Leagues from Paris; they were order'd on Tuesday last, to return to Pontoise, where 'tis thought they will stay till the King's Majority; for they still refuse to register the Papers which concern the Bank, the India Company, and the Constitution. The Cardinal de

Neailles publish'd his Mandate upon the last Subject on Wednesday last.

LONDON, November 17.

We hear the Bank gave out Bills of Exchange, payable at 3 Days Sight to any Persons in distant Places, or to their Orders, which may prevent Losses by the Mills being robbed.

The Reverend Dr. Hutchinson, Minister of St. Edmond's-Bury in Suffolk, succeeds the late Dr. Smith (who died last Week at the Bath) in the Bishoprick of Downe and Connor in Ireland.

The Reverend Dr. Waddington is made a Fellow of Eton-College, in the Room of Mr. House deceased.

The Journeymen Tailors, who were some Time ago confined to the Gatehouse, were last Night brought to the Cock-pit, where they were admitted to Bail.

On Tuesday there was a General Council at St. James's, wherein His Majesty was present.

A Proclamation is order'd for a General Fast, to be observed throughout Great-Britain, on Friday the 16th of December next, for imploring the Blessing on their Kingdoms, and to beseech Almighty God, to preserve us from the Infection which reigns in several European Countries.

The Barbours, Orons, and others, who are, as also, the Thunders, a Sort of African Merchants, have performed their Quota of the money, and shut down, last Tuesday, to pay more.

The same Day, the Duke of Devonshire's Godfather for His Majesty, and the Duke of Devonshire's Godmother, to a Child of Mr. Anson, were baptiz'd.

We hear, that the Reverend Mr. Trap is to preach before the Sons of the Clergy, on the 8th of December next, at Dartmouth, where yesterday came to the Entrance of this Harbour the ship of Mr. Trap, and for this Place from Croftwick, laden with the said Sons of the Clergy, who were all in perfect Health; but on the Tuesday, the said Mr. Trap, that he must go to Plymouth to perform his duty, he proceeded immediately with the Wind at N. by W. The same Day came in the four Brothers of and for Exon, from Oporto, with Fruit. This Day came in the Merchant ship and for Exon, with Fruit. Belfast, Nov. 14. This Morning arriv'd the Subbury from Newfoundland.
