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## PART I.

## Of the PRIVY COUNCIL.

T is generally composed of the most eminent Persons in the Kingdom, sit to advise his Majesty upon all Emergencies; and upon whose Wisdom, Vigilance, and Integrity depend in a great Mea-sure the Honour and Welfare of his Majesty's Do-minions in all Parts of the World; as frequently minions in all Parts of the World; as frequently determining Controversies of great Importance; sometimes touching Lands and Rights between Party and Party, whereof there are very many Precedents: And the Judges of England in some difficult Cases were not wont to give Judgment, until they had first consulted the King, and his Privy Council.

The King may declare to, or conceal from his Privy Councils.

Counsellors, whatever he thinks fit; and has a select Council out of their Number, commonly called, The Cabinet Council, with whom his Majesty determines fuch Affairs, as are most important, and require the utmost Secrecy.

By

By the Advice and Consent of the Privy Council the King issues Proclamations, Declarations for War or Peace, for the Meeting or Dissolution of Parliaments and Convocations. Here all Great Officers of State. and Governors of the Plantations, and Islands of Guernsey and Fersey, are sworn; Sheriffs declared, and other Officers for public Governments. From hence an Order of his Majesty in Council is sufficient Authority to pass public Grants for Incorporations. Patents, &c. Many Kinds of Commissions, Instructions, Noli Prosegui's, Pardons, &c. Here all his Majesty's Subjects, or others, have free Access to deliver in to the Council-Board Representations, Memorials, and Petitions; and by Committees of this Board are heard and determined any Grievances, Causes of Appeals, and Complaints from the Plantations, &c. And all Affairs relating to the Islands of Jersey, Guernsey, Minorca, and the Leeward Islands.

A Privy Counsellor, tho' but a Gentleman, has Precedency of all Knights, Baronets, Yeomen, Sons of Barons, and Viscounts, and is styled, Right Honourable; and their Persons are held so sacred, that since the late villainous Attempt of the Marquis de Guistard in the Council-Chamber, 'tis made Felony by Act of Patliament to make an Attempt against their

Lives.

A Privy Counsellor is made by Virtue of an Oath only, viz. "That according to his Power he shall "truly, justly, and equitably advise his Majesty in all Matters to be treated of in Council, and to keep them Secret.

General Councils, and Cabinet Councils, are usually held at the Court, where his Majesty is actually residing; and Committees at the Cock pit at White-Hall.

A Council is seldom or never held without the Presence of one of the Secretaries of State. [3]

Of the Secretaries of State.

ILL the Reign of King Henry VIII. there was but one Secretary of State, when that Prince thought fit to have this Office discharged by two Persons of equal Power and Authority, and both called Principal Secretaries of State; whose Employment being of great Trust makes them very considerable. Before Queen Elizabeth's Time they did not fit in Council, but only prepar'd Business for the Council-Board in a Room adjoining to the Coun-

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cil-Chamber; which done they came in, and stood one on the Right Hand, and the other on the Left.

As for Domestic Affairs both public and private, the two Secretaries of State do equally receive what-foever is brought to them, be it for the Crown, the Church, the Militia, private Grants, Pardons, Dispensations, &c. except Ireland, and the Plantations, which properly belong to the elder Secretary. Petitions to the Sovereign, when read, are returned to the Secretaries for Answer, all which they dispatch according to the King's Command and Direction.

As to foreign Affairs, they are divided into two Provinces; the Lord Harrington has now the Northern Province, as the Low Countries, Germany, Denmark, Sweden, Poland, and Muscowy. And the Duke of Newcastle the Southern, as France, Swifferland, Spain, Italy, Portugal, Turkey, &c.

On the 3d of February 1708-9. her late Majesty Queen Anne in Council was pleased to declare, That the public Business encreasing (by Reason of the happy Union with Scotland) she had thought sit to appoint a third Secretary of State for that Part of Great-Britain, which Office at present is vacant.

The Secretaries of State have the Custody of that Seal, which is properly called the Signet, and gives Denomination to an Office called the Signet-Office, wherein are four Clerks employed, who prepare such Things, as are to pass the Signet in Order to the Privy or Great Seal. All Grants signed by the King are returned hither, which transcribed are carried to one of the principal Secretaries of State, and sealed, and then it is called a Signet; which being directed to the Lord Privy Seal is his Warrant. Depending on the Secretaries Office is likewise an Office called the Paper Office, the Keeper whereof has in his Custody

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and Charge all the public Papers, Writings, and Matters of State, Council Letters, &c. of the public Ministers abroad, and generally all the Letters, and Dispatches, which pass through the Secretaries Offices, which are deposited in a Sort of Library at Whitehall.

All the Under-Secretaries and Clerks are in the Choice of the Secretaries of State without Reserve to any Person; the former of which receive Orders and Directions from them for writing Dispatches Foreign or Domestic, which they give to the Chief Clerk, who distributes them to the Under-Clerks. The Salaries of the Secretaries of State are each 1850 l. per Annum with the Fee of 100 l. a Year out of the Exchequer; and the lawful Perquisites make it computed worth 8000 l. per Annum. The Under-Secretaries have no Salaries, but their Fees and Perquisites make them ample Amends. The Salaries of the Chief Clerks in each Office are 100 l. per Ann. The first of the other Clerks in each Office, as Clerk and Translator, 100 l. and the rest 40 l.

There are Forty Messengers, that are chiefly under the Direction of the Secretaries of State, being always ready to be sent with all Manner of Dispatches Foreign and Domestic: They are also employed with the Secretaries Warrants to take up Persons for High Treason, Libelling, or other Ossences against the State, which do not at first so properly fall under the Cognizance of the Common Law, and are perhaps not sit to be divulged in the ordinary Course of Justice. Such Prisoners as they apprehend, are usually kept at their own Houses, for which they are allowed by the Government 6 s. 8 d. per diem. When they are dispatched abroad, they have an Allowance for their Journey as stated, viz. to Paris 30 l. to Holland 25 l. to

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Edinburgh 30 1. to Ireland 30 1. and fo in Propos. tion to other Places; Part of which Money advanced them for their Journey. They are often times dispatched to very remote Parts, as Italy Germany, Spain, Constantinople, &c. They wait Twenty at a Time Monthly, distributed, Ten on the two Secretaries of State, and the rest on his Majesty, the Council, and the Lord Chamberlain of his Majesty's Houshold, in whose Gift are their Places, and if purchased, are reckoned worth 3001 and upwards.

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#### A LIST of His Majesty's Housbold.

LORD STEWARD of the King's Houshold, and the Servants under his Direction.

He was antiently the highest Officer under the King, and is now the principal Officer for the Civil Government of his Majesty's Servants below Stairs, the Officers over whom he presides being to be seen in the Order following. He is constituted by the Delivery of a white Staff, which is esteem'd his Commission. By Virtue of his Office, without any other Commission, he judges all Offences committed within the Court, or the Verge thereof, and gives Judgment according to their several Demerits: At the Death of the Sovereign he breaks his Staff over the Hearse wherein the Royal Corps is deposited, and thereby discharges all the Officers under his Jurisdiction.

These Officers compose the Board of Green-Cloth, so called from a Green Cloth where they sit, on which is depicted the Arms of the Accompting-House, viz. Vert, a Key Or, and a Staff Argent Saltire, signifying their Power to reward or punish, and is properly a Court of Justice continually sitting in the King's House. To which also belong four principal Clerks, who are Officers of good account; they have their Business and Attendance at Court assign'd them by the Board of Green-Cloth. All Bills of Comptrolment, &c. relating to the Office, are allotted and allowed by the Clerks Comptrollers, and summ'd up and audited by the Clerks of the Green Cloth. They likewise sit in Judgment with the Lord Steward, on Trials, &c.

The second Clerk waits and appoints the Diet as aforesaid; and likewise attends the King in his Progress, when appointed by the Green-Cloth. They wait in Turns by Months.

The Cooks have their Waiting in Turns likewise Monthly, and have Diet during Waiting. The chief Cook has an Allowance for the first

Dish sent up to the King's Table.

The Yeomen are chiefly employ'd in Soups, Ragousts, &c. The Grooms for boil'd Meats; and the Children for all Meats roasted; and each of these has his proper Station in the Kitchen. Of the Scourers, Turn-Broaches, &c. nothing need be faid, they carry their own Denomination.

#### Gentlemen of the Privy-Chamber.

King Henry the Seventh was the first English Prince that establish'd this Society of Gentlemen, limited their Number to 48, and gave them the Title of Honourable; which Establishment has successively been continued in every King and Queen's Reign to this present Time. The chief End of their Institution was to wait and attend on the King and Queen, at Court, in their Diversions, Progresses, and on all emergent Occasions. Six of them are constantly appointed by the Lord Chamberlain, with a Nobleman, and the Master of the Ceremonies, to accompany all Foreign Ministers from Crowned Heads, in their Publick Entries, and to their Audiences; to which End they were generally chosen out of the Sons of the Nobility, or the first Rank of Gentlemen in the Kingdom,

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Kingdom, and were always held in good Repute in Court: That they have been often fixed upon to represent the Person of the Lord Chamberlain, or the Vice-Chamberlain, in their Absence; for which Reason King James the First, and King Charles the First, order'd them to take Place next to the Gentlemen, or Lords of the Bed-Chamber. And in the Reign of a Sovereign Queen, as the late Queen Anne, next to the Vice-Chamberlain. At every Coronation, two of these Gentlemen, clad in Ducal Robes, do personate the Dukes of Aquitain and Normandy; and at all publick Solemnities, Interviews, Cavalcades, &c. they have their Station appointed by the Heralds, to go next the Privy-Counsellors, not Peers ! When the King or Queen goes by Water to Parliament, two of these Gentlemen have Place in the same Barge; and likewise kneel upon the second Step of the Throne, where no other Officer is suffer'd to interpose before them.

As a farther Mark of the Royal Favour and Trust which is reposed in them, they are empower'd to execute the King's verbal Commands, without producing any written Warrant, or Order, their Persons and Characters being in themselves sufficient Authority. For Instance, when Cardinal Wolsey, in the Time of Henry the Eighth, was arrested for High Treason, by a Gentleman of the Privy-Chamber, he immediately submitted, saying, his Person was a sufficient Warrant, notwithstanding he had resuled to submit to the Arrest by a great Lord, though he had an Order in Writing.

With all these considerable Honours there is no Salary, Fee, or Perquisite annexed to their Offices. They have, at certain Times, Diet and Table at Court; and on the Death of the Sovereign, have Mourning allowed them out of the Wardrobe. They are excused, by Virtue of their Offices, from being Sheriffs, or any other Penal Office in the Town

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and County where they live, which makes many Gentlemen of good Fortune desire the Place, which is in the Gift of the Lord Chamberlain.

The Badge of his Office is a Gold Chain and Medal, having on one Side an Emblem of Peace, King James's Motto; and on the Reverse, the Emblem of War, with Dieu & mon Droit. He is always supposed to be a Person of good Address, and Master of Languages. He is constantly attending at Court, and hath under him an Assistant Master, or Deputy, who holds his Place during the King's Pleasure. There is also a third Officer, call'd Marshal of the Ceremonies, whose Business it is to receive and distribute the Master's Orders, or the Deputy's, for the Service, but without their Order can do nothing.

#### The Band of Gentlemen Pensioners.

This Honourable Band were first instituted by King Henry the Seventh, for the greater Splendor of his Court, being defigned as a Guard for his Person; for which Reason they have their Posts of Waiting affigned them in the Presence-Chamber. Their principal Duty is to attend the King to and from the Chapel, whom they receive either in the Presence-Chamber, or sometimes at the Door of the Privy-Lodgings, lining each Side of the Room in Ranks with their Battle-Axes, which are their antient Arms. They are in Number Forty; and, by their original Institution, are obliged to keep three double Horses, or Servants, who are, as well as themselves, to have proper Arms, and fo are properly a Troop of Guards, and as such, have been muster'd by their own Officers: But this last Part of their Duty has been frequently dispensed withal. They wait half at a time Quarterly; but on Christmas-Day, Easter-Day, Whit funday,

Whitfunday, All Saints, St. George's Feast, the Coronation Days, and on other extraordinary Days, they are obliged all to give personal Attendance, under the Penalty of the Cheque. They have the Honour likewise to carry up the King's Dinner on the Coronation-Day, and on St. George's Feast; at which Time he usually confers the Honour of Knighthood on two such Gentlemen as the Captain presents; which last Office hath never been given any Person under the Degree of a Nobleman, unless a Knight of the Garter, which, of late Years, hath ever happen'd.

Teomen of the Guard.

They are properly call'd the Yeomen of the Guard of the King's or Queen's Body, and according to their Institution are wont to be 250 Men of the best Rank under Gentry, and of larger Stature than ordinary; for every one was to be fix Foot high. There are at present 100 of them in constant Duty, and 70 more not in Duty, and as any of the Hundred die, his Place is supplied out of the Seventy. They go clad after the Mode in the Time of King Henry the Eighth. They had formerly Diet as well as Wages, when in Waiting, but this was taken off in the Reign of the late Queen. Their Attendance is on the King's Person both at Home and Abroad. At Court they have a Room allotted for them only, which is called the Guard-Chamber. The Officers and Yeomen are at the Disposal of the Captain, and he at the Appointment of the King.

He hath the Government of the King's Chapel, and the chusing of all the Officers thereof; namely, the Sub-Dean, and twenty-fix Gentlemen of the Chapel. The Dean himself is chosen by the King, who, as Dean of the Chapel, acknowledges no Superior but the Sovereign: for as the King's Palace is exempt from all temporal Jurisdiction, so is his Chapel from all spiritual; not being within the Diocese

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of any Bishop, but as a Royal Peculiar exempt, and reserved to the Visitation and immediate Government of the King. All Offerings made by the King or Queen, on the twelve principal Festivals of the Year, are distributed amongst the Poor by the Dean of the Chapel.

The Clerk of the Closet, or Confessor to the King, is usually a Bishop; whose Office is to attend at the King's Right Hand during Divine Service, to resolve such Doubts as may arise in Spiritual Matters; but chiefly to wait on his Majesty in his private Oratory or Closet, and to say Grace when his Majesty eats. There are under him three Deputies and a Closet-Keeper.

The King's Chaplains are 48 in Number; fo that there are four appointed for every Month, which is their Time of Waiting. 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in the private Oratory; and to fay Grace to the King at Dinner, in the Absence of the Clerk of the Closet. During Waiting they have a Table and Attendants, but no Salaries; which, besides the Honour of the Employment, is abundantly made up to them, as being constantly in the King's Eye for Spiritual Preferment, and being esteem'd to merit from him for this their Attendance at Court.

When there are five Sundays in a Month, as it sometimes happens, the Lord Chamberlain appoints the Preacher. The Chaplains are likewise in his Lordship's Gift.

These have their Duty and Attendance in the Royal Chapel. They are 32 in Number, whereof 12 are Priests, and one of them Confessor of the Houshold. The other 20 are call'd Clerks of the Chapel, who assist in the Personnance of Divine Service.

One of the first 12 is chosen for Confessor of the Houshold, whose Office it is to read Prayers every G Morning

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Morning to the Houshold Servants, to visit the Sick, examine and prepare Communicants, and administer the Sacraments.

Another well vers'd in Musick is chosen for Organist, who is Master of the Children, to instruct them in Musick, and what is necessary for the Service of the Chapel. There is a 2d of them likewise an Organist, and a 3d a Lutenist, and a 4th a Violist.

There are likewise three Vergers, so call'd from the Silver Rods they usually carry in their Hands; being a Serjeant, a Yeoman, and Groom of the Vestry; the former of which attends the Dean and Sub-dean, finds Surplices and other Necessaries for the Chapel, and keeps the Pews and Seats of the Nobility and Gentry. The Groom has his Attendance within the Chapel Door, and looks after it.

THE Master of the Horse is esteem'd the third Great Officer at Court, giving Precedency only to the Lord Steward, and Lord Chamberlain. To him is committed the Charge of ordering and difposing all Matters relating to the King's Stables, Races, Breed of Horses, &c. as he antiently had of all Posts in England. He hath the Power of commanding the Equerries, and all the other Officers and Tradesmen employ'd in the King's Stables; to all which he gives by his Warrant to the Avener, the Oath of Allegiance, &c. for the true and faithful Discharge of their Duty. He has the Charge of the Revenues appointed for the Service and Maintenance of the King's Horses; for the Expence of the Stables, for Coaches, Litters, Sumpter-Horses, &c. He hath also the Privilege, which no other Servant of the Crown hath, of making use of any Horses, Pages or Footmen belonging to the King's Stables; so that his Coaches, Horses, and Attendants are the King's, and have the King's Arms and Liveries. At any folemn Cavalcade, he has the Honour to ride next be-'hind the King, and leads a Horse of State. Tho' this great Officer had no Rank affigned him by the Act of Precedency in the Time of Henry the Eighth, yet by Virtue of his Office, he precedes other great Officers at Court.

be the King's Prime Minister Judicatory between the Sovereign and his People; having the Title of his Office from the Word Treasury. The Place for securing the publick Money is call'd the Exchequer, which consists of two Parts, the Upper and the Lower: The first is that where the Barons hold their Court, and the latter under the Lord Treasurer's Care, and frequently call'd the Treasurer

This Office was formerly enjoy'd by the chief Ecclesiasticks, who had only the Titles of Treasurers of the Exchequer till the Time of Edward IV. fince which no Bishop, Dean, &c. hath been Treasurer, except Bishop Laud in the Time of King Charles I. The last Lord High Treasurer was Robert Earl of Oxford and Earl Mortimer, fince whose Time this high Office hath been continued in Commission. The Commissioners have the Choice of all the Officers any way employ'd in collecting the Revenues of the Crown, and have in their Gift all the Customers, Searchers, and all other Officers in the Customs, except those for collecting the Duties on Coals. In all the Ports of England they have the like Nomination of all the Escheators in every County; and likewise the Power of Leasing out Crown Lands, &c.

Officers of the Receipt of his Majesty's Exchequer.

The Chancellor and Under-Treasurer of the Exchequer, is an Officer of very great Power and Authority, not only in the Exchequer Court, but in the Management and Disposal of the Royal Revenue. Upon special Occasions, he sits above all the Barons of the Exchequer, and has the Superintendency and Comptrol over the Treasurer's Rolls, and the Custody of the Exchequer Seal. He is always of the Privy-Council. The Office of the Comptroller of the Pipe, Clerk of the Pells, Clerk of the Nichils, and the Seal of the Court, are in his Gift.

Chancellor and Under-Treasurer of the Exchequer. Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Walpole, Knt. of the Garter.

Auditor of the Receipt of the Exchequer.

The Auditor of the Exchequer is the next Officer to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and this Office is of great Value. Here are filed all the Tellers Bills, whereby they charge themselves with all Monies received, and all Orders drawn to be signed by the Treasury (having first a Warrant from the Commissioners for that End) for issuing Money by virtue of Privy-Seal, which are register'd by the Clerk of the Pells, and entred in the Auditor's Office, and there lodg'd by Warrant from the Treasury; he also makes Debentures to the several Persons who have Fees, Annuities, or Pensions, by Letters Patent,

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or Warrants from the Crown, out of the Excheouer; and directs them for Payment to the Tellers. He receives every Day the State of the Accompt of each Teller, and certifies Weekly the Whole to the Treasury, and they present the Estimate or Balance to the King. He makes half yearly, at Michaelmas, and Lady-Day, a Book call'd a Declaration, which contains methodical Abstracts of all Accompts and Payments in the preceding half Year; one Copy whereof he delivers to the Board of Treasury, and another to the Chancellor and Under-Treasurer of the Exchequer. He keeps likewise several Registers appointed for paying all Persons in course upon distinct Branches of the Revenue. He is Scriptor Talliorum, and has several Officers under him to manage the whole Produce of Monies receiv'd, difburs'd, and remaining. He also keeps the Key of the Treasury, where the antient Leagues of the Realm, and many Records of the King's-Bench, and Common-Pleas do lie; and no Search can be made without the faid Key comes, with the two Keys of both the Chamberlains of the Exchequer.

mission) is committed the Government of the British Navy, with Power to decide all Controversies and Causes Maritime, as well civil as criminal, for which there is a particular Court for such as happen either on our own Coast, or beyond Sea among his Majesty's Subjects: And of such Wrecks and Prizes as are call'd by the Lawyers Logon, Jetson, and Flotson, that is, Goods lying in the Sea, floating, or cast on Shore; excepting in such Royalties as are granted to the Lords of the Manor, &c. All great Fishes called Royal Fish, except Whales and Sturgeon: A Share, of Prizes in Time of War, and the Goods of Pyrates and Felons condemn'd by a Court of Admiralty.

The Lord High Admiral, or Lords of the Admiralty, have likewife the sole Direction of equipping and fitting out the Navy, being advertis'd thereof by the Surveyors of the Navy what Ships are most fit for present Service. They appoint the Captains, and other Officers, and grant Warrants for Imprefing Seamen, &c.

Besides the Secretary and Under Secretary, and Chief Clerk, there are several other Clerks employ'd in the Dispatch of Business, and are in Number as the Board shall think proper.

Commissioners for Victualling his Majesty's Navy.

The Victualling his Majesty's Navy has formerly been taken by Contract, but it now manag'd by seven Commissioners, who have their Agents at the several Ports of the Kingdom. They contract for all manner of Provisions and Necessaries, and have Tradesmen for killing of Meat, salting of it, for Baking, Brewing, &c. by which the King's Fleet is constantly well served.

The two first of the Commissioners of the Transport, being also Commissioners of the Navy, have no Salaries.

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# Office of ORDNANCE.

THE Master General of the Ordnance hath the Supreme Power and Superintendency over his Majesty's Office of Ordnance, which is the standing and grand Magazine of Arms, Habiliments, Instruments, and Utensils of War, as well by Sea as Land, not only for those lodg'd in the Tower, but in all the Garisons, Castles, Forts, &c. in England, from whence, as Occasion requires, his Majesty's Armies, &c. are supplied. From him are derived all Orders and Dispatches relating to the same, as the Service shall best require. It is a Place of very great Honour and Trust, and of late has been often annex'd to the Office of General and Commander in Chief. In the King's Gift.

THEY are Officers of great Distinction, appointed by the King for managing the standing Militia by the King, for managing the standing Militia of the Country, and all Military Matters: They are generally of the principal Nobility, and those of the best Interest in the County. They are to form the Militia in Case of a Rebellion, &c. and march at the Head of them as the King shall direct. They have the Power of commissioning Colonels, Majors, Captains, and Subaltern Officers. Also to present the King with the Names of the Deputy-Lieutenants, whom he is to felect from the best Gentry in the Country, and are to act in his Absence. No Subject is to be charged with a Horseman, unless he has 500 l. a Year, or 6000 l. personal Estate; nor with a Foot Soldier, unless he have so I yearly, or 600 l. personal Estate. Subservient to the Lords Lieutenants, and Deputy Lieutenants, are the Justices of the Peace, who, according to the Orders they receive from them, are to iffue out Warrants to the High and Petty Constables, &c. for military Service, &c.

THE Constable of the Tower hath the Honour and Title of chief Governor thereof, tho' the executive Part of that great Trust seems to be lodg'd in the Lieutenant, or Governor of the Tower; who by Virtue of his Office, is to be in the Commission of Peace for the Counties of Middlesex, Kent and Surrey, and is to act under, and be subordinate to the Constable in all Things, as tho' he were perfonally present. He hath, besides his Salary, considerable Perquisites, as also for every Duke committed

mitted Prisoner, the Fee of 200 l. every Peer under the Degree of a Duke 100 l. and every Commoner 50 l. He hath likewise as a farther Perquisite the Disposal of the 40 Yeoman Warders Places, as they die off, who are under him, as he acts for the Constable; as likewise the Physician, the Gentleman Porter and Gunner. He hath also his Deputy to act under him, for the easier Discharge of his Duty. The Tower Major hath the Charge of inspecting the Guards and Garisons, and of other Military Duties. The Gentleman Porter holds his Place by Patent, has Charge of the Gates, to lock and unlock, and render the Keys to the Lieutenant. At the Entrance of a Prisoner he hath usually had a Composition Fee, viz. 30 l. of a Peer, and 5 l. of others.

Knights Companions of the Most Noble Order of the GARTER.

Of the ORDER of the GARTER.

THIS most Noble Order was instituted by King Edward III. in the Year 1350, which gives it the Pre-eminence of all other Orders Abroad, in Point of Antiquity. The faid King, after his Victories in France, chose to reward most eminent Men who had ferv'd him in those Wars, with this most Noble Order; and fince then, it has been generally conferr'd on Persons most distinguish'd by their high Characters or personal Merit. And the more to honour it, there have been more Emperors, Kings, and Foreign Princes of this one Order, than of all others in the World. It has always kept precifely to their primitive Number, never exceeding 26. The Patron of the Order is St. George, who fuffer'd Martyrdom under Dioclesian the Emperor; in Memory of whom they wear the George, adorn'd with Pearls and Precious Stones, appendant to a Blue Ribbon. Besides which, they wear on the Lest Leg a Garter enamel'd with Gold, Jewels, &c. with the Motto, Honi Soit Qui Mal y Pense; and a Buckle of Gold, from whence they were call'd, Knights of the Garter; without which two Ornaments they were never to appear in Publick. As for the rest of the Order, which is very magnificent, they are never worn but on folemn Occasions, as at St. George's Feast, at Installations, &v. Every Knight is bound to fasten an Escutcheon of his Arms, on a Plate of Metal over their several Stalls, with an Inscription of their Names, Titles, &c. which they remove as they are advanced in Order higher. In like manner they advance their Banners, Swords, and Helmets, taking

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Place according to the Seniority of their Election. except as to Emperors, Kings, and Foreign Princes. The Oath they subscribe at their Installations, befides other Articles, is this, viz. That whilft they are Fellows of the Order, they will defend the Honour, Quarrels, Rights, and Lordships of the Sovereign: endeavour to preserve the Honour of the Order, and all the Statutes made for the same.

# Prelate of the GARTER,

Dr. Richard Willis, Lord Bishop of Winchester,

Is the first principal Officer of the Order, and his Office is as antient as the Institution itself. William de Edynton, then Bishop of Winchester, was the first Prelate, and his Successors, Bishops of Winchester, have continued so ever since. 'Tis an Office of great Honour, but has neither Salary nor Fees allow'd him; only he has convenient Lodgings allow'd in Windsor-Castle, thence call'd Winchester Tower; and that as often as he comes thither (by the Sovereign's Command) he ought to have Court Livery allow'd for himself and Servants, according to the Degree

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of an Earl. Besides the Precedency granted him in Parliament, as Bishop of Winchester, which is next the Bishop of Durham. He had before, by Virtue of this Office, Place and Precedence before all Bishops, and next to the Archbishops. He is obliged to wear the Habit of the Order, on the Vigil, and Feast Day of St. George, whether in Parliament, or any other solemn Occasion or Festival whatever: And in all Proceeding and Ceremonies he is on the Right Hand of the Chancellor, and that he may marshal his Arms within the ennobled Garter; it having been customary for him to surround them, timpaled with those of the See of Winchester, with this Noble Order.

Chancellor of the GARTER,

Dr. Benjamin Hoadly, Lord Bishop of Salisbury.

This Office was formerly invested in one of the Knights Companions, which was the keeping of the common Seal, 'till King Edward IV. in the 16th of his Reign, thought it necessary to settle it distinct therefrom, at what Time the Seal was delivered to Richard Beauchamp, then Bishop of Salisbury, with the Title of Chancellor, which afterwards he had settled on him for Life, the Castle of Windsor, being within the Diocele of Salisbury, and to the succeeding Bishops of Salisbury; nor does it appear that ever this Order was broke thro', 'till King Edw. VI. in the 7th of his Reign, made Sir Wm. Cecil, then Secretary of State, Chancellor of the Garter, with Order that it should be executed by a Knight only; and fo it continued, the last Knight being Sir Thomas Roe, eminent for his great Abilities, and the many important Negotiations in which he was employed in the Reigns of King James I. and his Son Charles I. which last Prince, with the unanimous Consent of the Knights Companions, re-

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settled it on the Bishops of Salisbury. He has Place and Precedence in all Proceedings and Sessions, next the Prelate; and in all Places and Assemblies is rank'd after the Knights Privy Counfellors, and before the Chancellor of the Exchequer. The Statutes allow him Residence in Windsor-Castle, thence called the Chancellor's Tower, as likewise Diet and Livery in the Sovereign's Court, as were allow'd the Prelate. At the Institution he had no Pension allow'd, 'till the Constitutions relating to the Order were establish'd, and then 100 l. per Ann. was settled on him, or else Fees in lieu thereof proportionable, from Offices or Promotions; but as to Fees or Perquisites, there are none due to him; for which Reafon he has the aforefaid Pension, and all his Disbursements touching the Affairs of the Order repaid, even to the Paper, Wax and Wafers, The Seal, of which he had Custody, was at first call'd the Common Seal, but now the Great Seal of the Order : the Use whereof is not only for sealing the Original Statutes appointed to remain perpetually in Windfor College, but likewise those Copies of which each Knight Companion is obliged to have one in his Keeping, with Letters of Licence, Mandates, and Certificates relating to the Order. There is also a Privy Signet, instituted by King Henry VIII. in the last Year of his Reign, in case the Sovereign should go beyond Sea, to feal fuch Acts as were made by the Sovereign whilst Abroad, to distinguish them from those of his Deputies here in England. The same Prince ordered the Arms of the Order both on the Common Seal and Signet, which were again altered by King James I: and King Charles I. and are appointed to be carried before the Sovereign on all publick Occasions, during St. George's Feast, &c. by the Chancellor, who is not permitted to be above ten Miles distant from the Court, unless by express Leave.

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# Register of the GARTER, Dr. Booth, Dean of Windsor.

This Officer was one of the three constituted at the first Institution of the Order. In the Time of Henry VIII, it was given to John Vesey, Dean of Windsor, and so continued to many of his Successors, not in respect that they were Deans, but that they were Canons of Windsor. King Charles I. ordain'd, That the Dean of Windsor, and the Register of the Garter, should always meet in the same Person. By the Constitution of his Office, he has 50 1. per Ann. allow'd, or Fees, &c. in lieu of it. He hath also Lodgings in the Castle of Windsor, and on all Solemnities bears on his Breast a red Book of the Order, with this Device, Two Pens in Saltire within the Garter.

# Garter Principal King at Arms,

This Officer was constituted by King Henry V. who, to add the greater Dignity, was pleased to assign him the principal Officer within the Office of College of Arms; and King Henry VIII. appointed him chief of all the Officers attending the Crown. The Duty of his Office, in relation to the Garter, is, in general, to perform whatever the Sovereign, Prelate, or Chancellor of the Garter shall injoin him, relating to the Order, in which he has many distinct and various Offices, such as carrying the Rod and Scepter at every Feast of St. George, when the Sovereign is present; to notify the Election of such as are new chosen; to attend the Solemnity of their Installations, and take care of placing their Arms over their Seats; to carry the Garter to Foreign

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Kings and Princes, for which Service it has been usual to join him in Commission with some Peer of the Realm. Queen Elizabeth assign'd this Officer a Badge of Gold, to be daily worn by him on his Breast, in a Gold Chain or Ribbon, with the Sovereign's Arms enamelled, and an Imperial Crown surrounded by the Garter; but Sir Edward Walker, when Garter, obtained Leave to impale St. George's Arms therein, with those of the Sovereign.

Usher of the Black Rod, Sir Charles Dalton, Knight.

His Deputy, Sir Wm. Sanderson, Baronet.

This Officer was also constituted by the Founder of the Order. In a Chapter held at Whitehall, 13 Charles II. it was ordain'd, That it should be fixed to one of the Gentlemen Ushers daily Waiters at Court, the eldest of which always holds his Place, and is called Gentleman Usher, Daily Waiter, and Black Rod. As to his Attendance at Court, 'tis already spoken of. In relation to the Order of the Garter, he is appointed to carry the Rod at the Feast of St. George, and other Solemnities, which he makes use of as an Authority to attach Delinquents, who have offended against the Statutes of the Order, which he frequently does, by touching them therewith. He wears a Gold Badge, embellished with the Ensigns of the Order. He has a House in Windsor Castle, and other great Privileges.

# HERALD'S OFFICE.

Earl-Marshal, and Hereditary Earl-Marshal of England,

Thomas Howard Duke of Norfolk.

Deputy Earl-Marshal,

Francis Howard, Earl of Effingham.

THIS great Officer had antiently several Courts under his Jurisdiction, as the Court of Chivalry, now almost forgotten, and the Court of Honour, now quite laid aside. But he hath still some Preeminence in the Court of Marshalsea, where he may fit in Judgment against Criminals offending within the Verge of the Court, whence the chief Officer under him is called Knight-Mashal. Under him is also the Herald's Office, or College of Arms, the Officers being all subordinate to him. When any Disputes arise concerning Descents, Pedigrees, Escutcheons, &c. his Power is to determine them. This was incorporated by Richard III. and inlarged with many new Privileges by Philip and Mary; but of late Years his Power and Jurisdiction has been much impaired.

The Office of Earl-Marshal is Hereditary, in the most noble Family of Howard, and enjoyed by the Duke of Norfolk, the principal Branch thereof; tho' now, for Reasons of State, 'tis acted by Deputation; but it is to be observed, not given out of the Family of Howard. As to the Knight-Marshal, he will be seen in the List of his Majesty's Court, where he is placed.

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Garter, Principal King at Arms, respecting his Duty in the Herald's Office,

John Anstis, Esq;

Under the Earl-Marshal of England, there are three Regulators of Arms, Ceremonies, Pedigrees, and Descents of Nobility and Gentry, of which he is called the Chief or Principal King at Arms. Antiently the Kings at Arms were created by the King with great Ceremony; but now the Earl-Marshal is commissioned to do every Thing of that Kind, by whom this Officer is created and crowned in a solemn Manner.

John Anstis, Jun. Esq; hath a Reversionary Grant of this Place.

Charencieux, King at Arms, Knox Ward, Esq;

So called from the Duke of Clarence, third Son of King Edward III. which Dukedom escheating to King Edward IV. by the Demise of George Duke of Clarence his Brother, he created this Officer, who properly appertained to that Duke, and therefore named Clarencieux, from the French, or Clarentius in Latin. His Office is to marshal and dispose the Funerals of all the lower Nobility, as Baronets, Knights, Esquires, and Gentlemen; but his Jurisdiction is only on the South Side of Trent, and much of his Duty is now laid aside. He is created by Letters Patent, and that with a great deal of Ceremony.

Norroy, or Northroy, King at Arms, Stephen Martyn Lake, Esq;

So called, in regard that he and Clarencieux divide England betwixt them, and he hath the same Duties North of Trent, as the other hath South. They formerly had Power by Charter to visit noble Families, take Inquisitions post Mortem, state their Pedigrees, &c. but this necessary Part of their Office, as well as some others, was curtailed by the Statute of the 12th of Charles II.

#### HERALDS.

These have sometimes been called Dukes at Arms, as appertaining to Dukes. Their Office is to wait at Court, attend publick Solemnities, proclaim War and Peace, and from thence, probably, call'd Heralds, from two German Words, Here, and Helt, or Held, i. e. the Armies Champion, to denounce War, or offer Peace, as the Feciales of the Romans did. They have their distinct Titles, as you see; have Lodging in the College, Salary and Perquisites, especially on Searches in the College Books for Pedigrees, Arms, &c. There is also one Herald Extraordinary, (formerly two) who officiates upon Occasion.

There are likewise four Under Graduates, called Pursuivants, who are ready always to execute the Orders of their superior Officers, properly, and more especially in Martial Causes; and therefore are called Pursuivants at Arms, to distinguish them from Pursuivants, or Messengers, of other Courts. The Service of these, and indeed of the whole College, lies in marshalling and ordering Coronations, Marriages, Christenings, Funeral, &c. of the Royal Family, and formerly of other great Families, and for other Duties, enough already mentioned. They have their distinct Titles, as are seen annexed, and have Lodgeings, &c.

IN the 7th of Edward VI. all Persons were prohibited selling Wine by Retail, without Licence, from the greatest Part of the Magistracy of any City, Borough or Town, and not above two to be R 2 licenced

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licenced in one Place, except in Cities, and large Towns, on Penalty of 51. In the 12th of Car. II, the King is impower'd to appoint Commissioners for Wine Licences, but their Salaries are not to amount to above Six-pence in the Pound of the Revenue arising by the said Act, which Revenue is duly to be paid into the Exchequer, and not charged with any Pension, &c. The Privileges of the Universities, and of the Company of Vintners in London, were saved by this Act. The 15th of Car. II. it was given to the Duke of Tork and his Heirs Male; but the 23d of Car. II. he had an Equivalent for it out of the Excise.

Commissioners of HAWKERS and PEDLARS.

THE Duty for Licensing Hawkers, Pedlars, and Petty Chapmen, was first given in the 9th and 10th of King William, 1697, to pay the Transport Service for the Reduction of Ireland, this Sum then amounted to 330769 l. 10 s. 7 d. and this Sum to be yearly raised hereby was 6000 l. Nett, in the following Manner, viz. Every Hawker travelling on Foot to pay 4l. per Ann. and with Horse, As or Mule, 8 l. per Ann. And every Hawker ought to certify in what Manner they will trade, and to pay half of the Duty down, and give Bond for the other at six Months End, and two Shillings per Pound allowed for prompt Payment.

2. The Penalty of Hawking without Licence is 121. one Half to the Informer, and the other to the Poor of the Parish where such Discovery shall be made. If any one so Trading, shall, on Demand made, resulte to shew his Licence to a Justice of Peace, Constable.

of the Parish, where such Demand is made, for the Poors Use. Persons forging a Licence, or travelling with such, shall forseit 50 l. one Half to the King, and the other to the Prosecutor. If any Constable, &c. shall resule to assist in the Execution of this Act, he shall forseit 40 l. one Half to the Informer, and the other to the Poor.

3. Any Person may seize and detain such Hawker for the Production of his Licence, till he can notify the same to a Constable, &c. the Penalty to be levied on a Hawker, &c. by a Justice of Peace's Warrant, shall be by Distress of Goods, and the Overplus returned, after Charges deducted. This Act does not forbid the felling of News Papers, Acts of Parliaments, Forms of Prayer, Licenced Almanacks, or other Licenced Printed Books; or Fish, Fruits or Victuals: nor does it hinder any Persons that are the real Workers of any Goods within the Realm of England, Dominion of Wales, or Berwick upon Tweed, or their Children, Apprentices, or Agents, from felling fuch Goods; nor any Cooper, Glazier, Plumber, Tinker, or others mending Kettles, Tubs, Houshold Goods, &c.

4. This Duty is increased 4000 l. since the late King's Accession, by the Care of the Commissioners, and is become one of the Funds for the Payment of the South Sea Debt; and continued by the 5th of Queen Anne for 96 Years, and then for one Year longer.

5. The first Act was made on the Complaint of many Thousand Shop-keepers, that pay Rent and Parish Dues for Houses, and were by this Method of Hawking discouraged in their Business, and to prevent Vagrants and wandring Persons under Coalour of Hawking.

THE first Law that introduc'd this great Convenience, was made 12 Car. II. which enables the King to settle a Post-Office, and appoint a Governor, which is generally managed by two Persons, who have the fole Management of the Duty arising by Postage, and have under them about seventy Officers, who are all in their Gift, and are fworn, and give Security for the faithful Discharge of their Duties. Befides those here named, there are fix Clerks in the Foreign Office, who have 50 l. a Year Salary; and a Foreign Officer, who has 40 l. For the Inland Office, there are fix Clerks of the Road, the first has 100 l. a Year, and the other five, 60 l. a Year Salary, as have also the Clerks of the By-Nights. They have each also an Assistant Clerk at 60, and some 50 l. a Year, with two Window Men at 60 l. and 50 l. per Ann. There are twelve Sorters, ten of which have 50 % and two 40 %. a Year; Sixty-seven Letter Carriers at 11 s. a Week, and four Porters. The Sorters are employ'd in forting the Letters for the proper

proper Roads, which fall under the Direction of the Clerks of the Roads, for further Dispatch. The Accountant General keeps an Account of all Money from the Clerks Books. The Alphabetkeeper in the Foreign Office, is the same which in the other Office is called Window Man; that is, he gives out such Letters as are defired to be kept in the Office till called for, and not sent by the Letter-Carriers. The Person, called the Foreign Officer, is appointed for the Dispatch of Letters which are to go into the Inland Office for farther Conveyance. The Sollicitor takes Securities for the faithful Difcharge of Officers Duties, and profecutes the same, if forfeited; as also to sue such as are in Arrears at the Post-Houses in the Country, when they do not make proper Payment. In the 9th of Queen Anne, (when the Kingdoms were united) an Additional Duty was laid, and the Post-Master was enabled to keep a Post in Edinburgh, and appoint Deputies. This Office of Post-Master the King may grant for Life, or Twenty-one Years. By the Penny-Post all Letters and Parcels not exceeding fixteen Ounces, are daily and hourly conveyed.

# Commissioners of Trade and Plantations.

THE Board of Trade and Plantations was first established by King William of Glorious Memory, in the 8th Year of his Reign, in pursuance of a Scheme laid and profecuted by two very great Men in their feveral Ways, Mr. Locke and Mr. Penn, commonly called Sir Wm. Penn. The Commissioners for managing the Office are Extraordinary and Ordinary: The former are the great Officers of the Kingdom, fuch as the Lord Chancellor, or Lord Keeper; the Lord President of the Council; Lord Keeper of the Privy-Seal; First Commissioner of the Treasury, or Lord High Treasurer; First Commissioner of the Admiralty, or Lord High Admiral; the two Secretaries of State, and Chancellor of the Exchequer. These are called Extraordinary Commissioners, because they have a Clerk to sit at the Board, and do so upon extraordinary Occasions, but have no Salaries as Commissioners of Trade. The Ordinary Commissioners are Eight in Number, and all Members of the House of Commons, excepting one, who is always a Lord, and is generally called Head of the Board. Their Salaries are 1000 l. each per Ann. The

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'The Charges of Postage of Letters from the Plantations, and Writing Implements, as also for Clerks. Messengers and Door-keepers, are paid by the Treafury. The Business of this Board is to enquire into the State of the Trade of England, at Home and Abroad; to consider how the Manufactures already fettled may be improv'd, and how new and profitable ones may be introduced; to provide for the Employment of the Poor, and to revive the Fishery. But it is to be observ'd, that altho' these Things are committed to their Care in their Commission, yet they feldom fall under Cognizance; their Lordships imploying themselves wholly in the Affairs of the Plantations. They meet every Day in the Week. except Saturdays, Sundays, and Mondays. They revise all the Laws passed by the Assembly in the Plantations, and after Examination of them, (and taking, formerly the Advice of his Majesty's Attorney, or Solicitor General, but now of Mr. Fane, one of his Majesty's Council at Law, appointed for that Purpose) make their Report to his Majesty, and accordingly they are allowed or disallowed. It is their Office also to prepare the Commissions and Instructions of all Governors, Deputy Governors, and Secretaries going Abroad; and it is likewise committed to them to look out for proper Persons to fill these several Offices, and to recommend them to his Majesty. But it must be remarked, that they never do interfere in these Matters upon any Occasion whatever. No Matters of Controversy come originally, or judicially before them, but they are first referred, and then they do but report their Opinion; upon which his Majesty proceeds as he thinks fit,



# Law-Courts of Great Britain.

Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain.

N former Times, the Offices of Lord Chancellor, and Keeper of the Great Seal, were distinct, but now they are the same Thing, by another Name, as late Instances have shewn us. He is constantly Speaker of the House of Lords, and his Grandeur is such, that he has four Places in the House of Lords; One behind the King of Scots Chair, the Second next the Dukes of the Blood, the Third on the first Wool-pack, and the Fourth at the Table. Of 72 Officers under him, 'tis observable, that 44 of them have Employment in Parliamentary Affairs, either upon its summoning, or during its siting; and his Warrant is the second Fiat that gives Birth or Dissolution to a Parliament. In fine, it is the highest Office in England that any Layman is capable of, and he is, under the King, Chief of all Magistrates. He is likewise sole Judge of the

Court of Chancery, or Equity, wherein he is impower'd to moderate the extreme Rigour of the Law, which the other Judges are bound to. The Proceedings of this Court are, for the most Part, like those of the Civil Law, by Bill or Plaint, Witnesses examined in private; the Decrees in English or Latin, not in French, and without Jury, by Decree of the Lord Chancellor. From this High Court are likewise issued out Commissions for Charitable Uses throughout England, or to inquire into any Abuses or Mis-employments of Money or Lands given to Charitable Uses, or Publick Benefits; including the Education of Orphans, the Relief of Prisoners or Captives, or the like. The Lord Chancellor hath the Gift of all the Ecclesiastical Benefices in the Breast of the Crown, under 201. a Year in the King's Books.

He is Conservator and Guardian to all Infants, with a Multiplicity of other Business, not essential to this Work, and too long for this small Treatise. Though the Salary is only 21001. yet it is computed worth 70001. per. Ann.

HE Master of the Rolls hath this Office by Patent, which is for Life. In the Absence of the Lord Chancellor, or Keeper, he sits as Judge in the Court of Chancery, and by Sir Edward Coke, is called his Assistant. At other Times he hears. Causes in the Rolls Chapel; he is also the First of the Masters in Chancery, and hath their Assistance at the Rolls; but all Hearings before him are appealable to the Lord Chancellor. He hath also his Writ of Summons to Parliament, and fits next to the Lord Chief Justice of England, on the feeond Wool-pack. He hath the keeping of the Parliament Rolls, and all the Rolls House for his Habitation, as also the Custody of all Charters, Patents, Commissions, Deeds, Recognizances, which being made up of Rolls of Parchment, gave Rife to the Name. In his Gift are the Six Clerks in Chancery, the Examiners, three Clerks of the Petty-Bag, and the fix Clerks of the Rolls Chapel, where the Rolls are kept.

The other Masters in Chancery are usually chosen out of the Barristers of the Common Law, and sit in Chancery, or at the Rolls, as Assistant to the Lord Chancellor, and Master of the Rolls, during Term-time. To them are also committed Interlocutory Reports, stating Accounts, taxing Costs, &c. and some times, by Way of Reference, they are impowered to make a final Determination of Causes. They have, Time out of Mind, had the Honour to sit in the Lords House, though they have neither Writs or Patent to impower them, but as Assistants to the Lord Chancellor, and Master of the Rolls.

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They had antiently the Care of inspecting all Writs of Summons, which is now performed by the Clerk of the Petty-Bag. When any Message is sent from the Lords to the Commons, it is carried by the Masters in Chancery. Before them Assidavits are made, Deeds, and Recognizances acknowledged.

The Office of Clerk of the Crown in Chancery is of very great Importance. He is, either by himself, or Deputy, constantly to attend the Lord Chancellor, or Lord Keeper, upon special Matters of State, and hath a Place in the House of Lords. He makes out all Writs for Elections of Members to serve in Parliament, upon a Warrant directed to him, on the Death, or other Removal of any Member. Likewise all Commissions of Oyer and Terminer, Gaol-Delivery, Commissions of Peace, with many other Commissions that are to pass the Great Seal, and may be executed by a Deputy. All Parliament Writs, which are fent from the Petty-Bag, are returned and kept by the Clerk of the Crown, so that the Petty-Bag gives, as it were, the Beginning, this the Continuance and Ending to a Parliament; by which the Clerk of the Crown acts in three Capacities. Before the Sitting of a Parliament, to receive Returns of Writs; in Parliament, for the Issuing of Writs; and in the Lords House, he reads the Titles of all Bills to be prefented to the Sovereign. The Six Clerks are Officers of great Account, next in Degree to the Twelve Masters in Chancery; their Duty is to inroll Commissions, Pardons, Patents, Warrants, &c. which pass the Great Seal. They are also Attornies for Parties depending in the Court of Chancery; under them were sixty, now ninety Clerks, who with the Under-Clerks dispatch the Business of the Office.

Court of King's Bench, why so called.

HIS Court is colled the King's Bench, because it is the supreme Court at Law, and the King is supposed to sit in Person as Judge of the Court, and

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and may so whenever he pleases; and therefore all Writs and other Process in this Court, are made returnable, Cor' Nobis, that is before the King Himself, and not Coram Justiciariis nostris, as the Form is in the Common Pleas. The Judges of this Court are, the Chief Justice, and three other Judges.

# Jurisdiction of this Court.

In this Court are determined, principally, Matters relating to the Crown, and the Peace; where any Person is aggrieved by any Order of Justices or Quarter-Sessions; and the Right of electing Mayors, Bailiss, Constables, &c, are often upon Mandamus's brought before this Court to be settled; and Prohibitions are from hence issued out to stay Proceedings in the Ecclesiastical, Admiralty, or any inferior Court, where the Matters appear to be triable at Common Law.

Subjects Right to sue in this Court.

The Subject has also a Right to sue any Person in this Court, for any Debt or Contract, as well as in any other Court, and may as advantageously and expeditiously proceed.

Chief Justice, - - - - - Sal. 2000!.

The Chief Justice of England is constituted by Writ, and is to hold, Quam din se bene gesserit; but the Chief Justice, and the other inserior Judges, have been formerly made only, Durante bene placito.

The being made Quam din se bene gesserit, establishes the Judge, so as that he cannot be removed, but upon some great Misdeameanor in his Office; whereas, he that held only Durante bene placito, was subject to be displaced at any Time during the King's Pleasure.

# Chief Justice's Salary.

The Salary used to be but 1500 l. per Ann. but since his late Majesty's Accession to the Crown, the Chief Justice's Salary is augmented to 500 l. a Term: And although by common Report, he must sit one Day in a Term in Court, or will not be intitled to his Termage; this is a vulgar Error; for unless it appears he voluntary absents so, as, upon a Scire facias, to be charged with Negligence, he will be intitled to it.

# Chief Justice's Authority and Office.

He is generally one of the Privy Council to His Majesty; and, as Chief Justice of England, can issue his Warrant to any Part thereof, for the apprehending any Person; and where any Person is indicted at the Quarter-Sessions, and absconds out of the County where such Indictment is laid, upon producing a Copy of such Indictment, signed by the Clerk of the Peace, the Chief Justice will grant his Warrant for apprehending him, where-ever he can be found. He goes the Circuits as other Judges do, but tries Causes in London and Middlesex on certain Days in the Asternoon in Term-Time, as he is pleased to appoint, and on Mornings and in the Asternoon after Term; but can try Causes only

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on eight Days after Term in Middlesex. He presides under his Majesty in this Court; but when the Court divides in giving Judgment upon any special Argument, he hath but one Voice; so that if the Opinion of the Court should be equally divided, the Matter must rest 'till one of the Judges shall see just Reason to alter his Opinion. He is to attend the Parliament, but has no Vote, unless he be a Peer himself, but is to give his Opinion and Advice to the House by Virtue of a Writ of Assist, ance, and is frequently therefore consulted by them both in the making and repealing any Laws, or in altering or explaining them. He makes a Return of all Writs of Error in Parliament directed to this Court, and with his own Hand delivers the Writ of Error, and a Transcript of the Proceedings in the Cause into the House of Lords. He is generally in the Commission of Oyer and Terminer, for Trial of Criminals at Fustice Hall in the Old Baily, and in Commission of Delegates; and most Cases of criminal Matters, civil Action, Habeas Corpus, Pleas of the Crown, &c. come under his Cognizance and Jurisdiction. And he (or the Chief Justice of the Common Pleas) is appointed Speaker of the House of Lords pro tempore, in the Absence of the Lord Chancellor, or Keeper of the Great Seal.

The three inferior Judges of this Court, as well as other, go the Circuits, and are in Commission of Oyer and Terminer at the Old Baily; and their Salary is for each 375 l. a Term, and they are also severally intitled to their Termage, although they happen not to sit one Day in Court in the Term, unless voluntarily absenting, as before; and these Judges hold by Quam din se bene gesserint, as well as the Chief Justice.

The two Chief Clerks, or Prothonotaries, are Rowland Holt, (who is lately dead) and Edward Ventris, Esq; these are supposed to enter all the Pleadings and Judgments between Party and Party, although this Business is done by an entering Clerk under them, of whom we shall hereafter give a more particular Account; and all Writs of Latitat, Non Omittas, Bills of Middlesex, Habeas Corpus, &c. are subscribed with the Names of these Chief Clerks, wiz. Holt and Ventris, but now Ventris only.

Secondary, Samuel Clerk, Esq; Sal. 2001.

The Secondary acts as the Master of the Office on the Pleas-Side, and is the Chief Clerk's Deputy; and his Office is to examine any Person who is to be sworn an entering Clerk, or Attorney at large, whether he is duly qualified, and present him to the Chief Justice, and he administers the proper Oath to him before the Chief Justice, and signs all Notes for Rules to plead before Rules are given; and also signs

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figns all Judgments, and gives Costs upon them; and the Court upon any Motion in relation to the irregular Practice of any Clerk or Attorney generally refers the Examination thereof to the Secondary, (who after having examined the same) makes his Report to the Court; many other Matters are referred by the Court to his Examination. He also takes all Affidavits in Courts, (unless on the Crown-Side) and takes the Acknowledgement of all Deeds in Court; and in Term-Time, sits in Court under the Chief Justice at Westminster on Mornings, and attends in the Asternoons at his Office in the King's Bench Office in the Inner Temple.

### Nisi Prins Office.

This Office is in Grays Inn, and is acted by the Deputy, who is supposed to make up all Records of Nisi prius, as well for trying Causes in London and Middle few, as at the Assizes in this Court, throughout the Kingdom; but the entering Clerks do this, and he only examines and feals them: And the Clerk of the Nisi prius is the Custos Brevium for filing all judicial and original Writs, after the Sheriffs have returned them, and is chargeable if any be imbezzled or lost from the File. This Office, sitting the Court in Term-time, is kept in the Treasury, for the King's Bench at Westminster; and the Keys of the Upper Treasury are also kept in Mr. Tully's Custody, who hath several Clerks under him, and two Officers call'd Bag-bearers, who carry the Rolls, as call'd for, into Court, and take them from thence, and also seal the Records. The Rolls call'd the Imparlance Roll, is also kept in this Office; which is, when any Lord, or Member, or other Person, is fued by Original, he, by his entering Clerk, or Attorney, prays Time to appear, and the Deputy enters the Imparlance on a Roll, and gives, accord[ 16 ]

ing to the Custom of the Court, Time for him to imparle to the next Return-Day.

Clerks of the Papers.

There are two Clerks of the Papers, whose Business arises from the first Letter of the Defendant's Name, as the senior Clerk takes the Name of the Person that begins with an A, the other takes the Person's that begins with B, and so alternatively through the Alphabet; and their Office is, to make up all special Pleadings and Demurrers in Paper, and fet the fame, when they are prepared for Agreement, in a Paper for that Purpose, which is given to each of the Judges, and principal Council at the Bar. They read all Rules that are made, and Affidavits, (except in Causes on the Crown-Side) and attend at Westminster in Court in Term-time for that Purpose; and they give Rules in the Margin of the Paper Book, for the Defendant's Attorney to return the same in four Days after Receipt of it; or in Default, Judgment may be fign'd against the Defendant.

The Philizers make out all Process upon Originals (which are made out by the Cursitors, such as Capias's, Alias's, & Plures, &c. and the original Writs are brought to them after returned by the Sheriff, as well for their Warrant in suing out such Capias, &c. on them, as for them to file with the Custos Brevium. And here it is to be noted, that the Subject cannot bring any Action in this Court

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Court by Original, in Debt, but must proceed by Bill, and where any Action is brought in this Court by Original, if the Defendant, for Delay, or throany Missentry or Mistake in the Proceeding or Return of Process, is advised to bring a Writ of Error; the Writ of Error must be returnable in Parliament, and not in the Exchequer Chamber, as are other Writs of Error upon Actions which are brought in this Court by Bill.

### Clerk of the Rules.

His Office is to fit in Court before the Council, and take Minutes of the Resolution of the Court upon any Motions or Arguments (except on the Crown-Side), and afterwards attends at the King's Bench Office in the Afternoon, and draws up all Rules in form from the Minutes which he takes in Court: All Affidavits that are read in Court are filed with him, and he makes and is paid for Copies thereof: He also gives Rules to plead, and Rules upon Cepi Corporis, Habeas Corpus, Posteas, Writs of Enquiry, &c. and for the Prifoners of the King's Bench, which are called Day-Rules, to go out any Day in Termtime, to sollicit their Suits, and consult their Counsel, Attornies and Sollicitors, about their Affairs; so as they return in the Evening; which Rules are granted upon upon a Petition of the Prisoners, preferred and read to the Court upon their first Sitting.

Clerk of the Rules, Mr. James Munday.

The Clerk of the Errors Business is to allow all Writs of Error that are brought to him, and gives a Note under his Hand to the Plaintiff's Attorney, in Error, of such Allowance; and the shewing this Note to the Attorney for the Plaintiff in the Action, is a good Stop and Supersedeas to all further Proceedings upon the Judgment, 'till the Errer comes to be argued, which generally is four Terms Delay. For he takes the Number of the Roll of the Plaintiff's Attorney, and then goes to the Treasury, and transcribes all the Proceedings from thence, which is the Business of one Term; and the Plaintiff's Attorney examines the same, and signs an Examinator upon the Transcript; the next Term is only alledged Diminution; the third Errors are to be affigned; and the fourth Time they are to be argued in the Exchequer Chamber: But if the Writ of Error be returnable in the Beginning of the Term; or if an Execution be lodged in the Sheriff's Hands, and not returnable then, he makes out a Supersedeas to the Sheriff, and the Record is transcribed in the same Term.

The Clerk of the Errors, in the Exchequer Chamber Office, after the Transcript of the Judgment is delivered over to him, is to see the Errors assigned, and make up the Books for the Judges against the Day of Argument, and gives them a Paper of the Names of the Causes to be argued: And the Barons of the Exchequer, and Judges of this Court, sit in the

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the Exchequer Chamber upon one Day in the Term, to determine whether the Errors are sufficient or not; and after Judgment given, the Deputy makes a close Copy on Parchment of all the Proceedings, as well in the King's Bench as Exchequer Chamber, and annexes them with the Writ of Error to the Transcript, and gives them over to the Attorney, for whose Client the Judgment of the Court, upon arguing the Errors, is given, and he taxes the further Costs to be allowed thereupon, and attends also at the King's Bench Office in Term-time.

The Lord Chief Justice hath an Officer in Court immediately under him, called Associate, or Sociate, who is so called from the Meaning and Signification of the Word, as his Companion; and he, for his Lordship's greater Ease, receives all Records that are brought to be tried, and opens them, and delivers them to the Lord Chief Justice, when the Cause is called to be tried, and takes a Receipt of the Attorney for whose Client the Verdict is given by the Jury for the same.

The Clerk of the Nisi prius fits under the Lord Chief Justice, and calls the Cause and the Jury by their Names, and reads all Deeds and other Exhibits which are given in Evidence; he also takes the Verdict from the Jury, and marks the same, with the Costs, on the Back of the Panel.

The Number of these Gentlemen are not limited, but every one who has served his Time to an entering Clerk, if his Master certises his Service, (which must be five Years) he may be sworn; and the Business of an Entering Clerk, is not only to prosecute and defend all Business for their Clients, but also to enter upon and carry into the Treasury all the Proceedings in the Causes to be filed and recorded, and for that Purpose they are allowed Rolls of Parchment and Ink; and they also enter up the Proceedings, and carry in the Rolls for Attornies at large. The Clerk of the Declarations keeps his Office in the King's Bench Office, and is under the Secondary, and his Business is to receive all Declarations, and file them against Prisoners in the King's Bench, against Attornees, and also all Defendants, where the Attorney for the Plaintiff cannot find the Defendant's Attorney to deliver it to him in Person.

The Clerks of the Amercements attend upon Puisny Judges the last Day of every issuable Term, and carry up to the Exchequer the Estreat of Issues upon Oath, to the Lord Chief Baron.

This Office is kept in the King's Bench Office, and every Entring Clerk carries in to him, upon filing any Rolls, a Minute or Docket of the Causes on each Roll, and the Proceedings and Term they are of, and the Number-Roll, which he enters in a Book for that Purpose; and he keeps a Book in an Alphabetical Manner, in which all Attornies may, if they please, enter all General Issues; and the Attornies for the Plaintiss ought cautiously to look if there be any Plea in this Book before they sign Judgment. It is, with this Officer, every Purchaser of Freehold Estates ought carefully to look for Judgments against the Vendor, for he keeps his Docket-Books exactly and methodically every Term, and in an Alphabetical Method.

# Clerk of the Latitats, Mr. John Hawley.

Keeps his Office also in the King's Bench Office, and signs all Latitats, Non omittas, and other Writs of which the Entering Clerk or Attorney leaves a Note with him; and he enters these on a Roll, to which the Clerks and Attornies may have Recourse to search for any Writ by; and all Monies that are paid into Court are paid to him, and he takes the Fee and Money for the Certificate and Stamp of an Entring

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tring Clerk, or Attorney, upon his being first sworn and admitted.

The Officer for figning Bills of Middlesen, is Mr. Richard Dennis.

Marshal of the King's Bench, Richard Mullins, Esq;

The Marshal of the King's Bench Prison, is an Officer to whose Custody all Persons that are committed by the Court are fent, and all Persons that surrender themselves in Discharge of their Bail upon any Action, or that remove themselves by Habeas Corpus. His Prison is in Southwark, and he attends the Court in Term-time, and hath a Chair in Court to sit in, and keeps a Book in the King's Bench Office, which is called the Marshal's Book, in which the Clerks and Attornies enter all Surrenders and Commitments of Prisoners, to which any Persons may have Refort gratis: And the Prisoners, when they would have Day-Rules in Term-time, apply to him to have their Names put in the Petition before mentioned; and he is answerable for any Prisoner that makes his Escape.

# Marshal's Deputy, Mr. Thomas Owen.

This Officer is constantly attendant on the Chief Justice, in all Places where his Lordship goeth in a publick Capacity, and carries a Tipstaff before him as an Emblem of his Office. His Seat in Court is behind the Marshal's Chair, and in the Absence of the Marshal, if any Persons of Quality and Distinction are committed by the Court, they are put into his Custody, otherwise in all Common Cases, all Prisoners are committed to the Custody of the Tipstaffs.

There are two Criers, two Door-Keepers, and four Tipstaffs (besides the Criers to each particular Judge upon his Circuit,) belong to this Court.

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And also a Seal Office, which is call'd the Green Wax Seal Office, which is kept in the Inner-Temple-Lane, for sealing all Writs, as well issuing out of this Court, as out of the Common Pleas.

Note, The Sheriffs of Middlesex Office, is kept after ten of the Clock in the Forenoon, for the easier Dispatch of Business, at the upper End of Westminster-Hall in Term-time, under the Courts of Chancery and King's Bench.

### The Crown-Office.

THO' none of the Officers under the Lord Chief Justice are employ'd in summoning a Parliament, yet many of them have Business in other Matters during the Sitting of the Parliament; as in Cases of Error, &c. but more especially on Trials of Peers, wherein the Clerk of the Crown is the chief Manager. He hath likewise, out of Parliament, all Indictments in the Crown, Informations, Recognizances; and a Multitude of other Business runs thro' his Hands, as the Writing of all Pleadings, Declarations, and other Proceedings upon Records; but the executive Part is left to his Secondary or Deputy.

Court of Common Pleas: Its Jurisdiction.

THE Court of Common Pleas challengeth the greatest Variety of Law-Suits; for herein all Actions relating to Assurances of Lands, and other real Actions by original Writs are determinable, and also all Common Pleas, mixed or personal. The leading Process in that Court is a Capias; in the King's Bench, a Bill of Middlesex, or Latitat; in Chancery, a Subpæna. None but the Serjeants of the Coif, being next in Degree to the Judges, can plead in this Court; yet they are not prohibited from Pleading in any other Court of Law; whereas all other Graduates of the Law may plead in all other Courts, but not in this.

The Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas holds his Place by Patent (as the other Judges of this Court do) Quam din se bene gesserit. He hath also his Writ of Summons to Parliament, called a Writ of Assistance, as the Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench hath.

The Gourt of Exchequer: Its Antiquity and Jurisdiction. De sand Sand to

COME of our best Historians are of Opinion, ) this Court was erected by William the Conqueror, foon after his obtaining the Kingdom, taking its Form from the Exchequer establish'd in Normandy long before that Time. For the Authority and Juristiction

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risdiction of the Court of Exchequer, anciently, it was effected to great, that the Acts thereof were not to be examin'd or control'd in any other of the King's ordinary Courts of Justice. The Exchequer was the great Repository of the King's Records; thither the Records of the Court holden before the King, of the Court of Common Bench, and of the Justices in Eyre, were brought to be laid up in the Treasury there; and at this Day, we find the ancient Rolls and Records of the King's Bench, Common Pleas, and Justices Itinerant, reposited there, under the Custody of the Treasurer and Chamberlain of the Exchequer. Writs of Chancery were sometimes made out at the Exchequer, and Writs of Summons to assemble Parliaments. Or small address of the Crown year only

In ancient Times the Barons of the Exchequer, dealt in Affairs relating to Estate, or publick Ser-vice of the Crown and Realm. The Exchequer had Jurisdiction in Civil Causes, or Common Pleas, and was anciently held in the King's Court before the King; hay, it was adjudged in the Reign of King Taward I that a Plea Which concerned the King, ought to be determined before him. "It was a Court greatly concerned in the Prerogative, as well as the Revenue of the Crown: At the Exchequer it was the Care of the Treasurer and Barons, to see that the Rights of the Crown were not invaded by fuch as claim'd Liberties, or Exemption fo claim'd. And commonly when the King granted or confirmed Liberties by his Letters Patent, a Chofe Writ directed to the freafurer and Barons, was wont to iffue, reciting the Substance of Such Grant or Confirmation, and requiring the Barons to allow thereof. The immediate Profits of the Crown, as of Franchises, Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, Debts, Duțies

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Duties, Accounts, Goods, Chattels, all Disbursements, Seizures, and Fines imposed on the Subject, &c. are within the Jurisdiction of the Exchequer; and the King's Attorney may exhibit English Bills for any Matter concerning the King, in Inheritance or Profits.

# Right of the Subject to sue in the Exchequer.

In like Manner, any Person that finds himself aggriev'd in any Cause prosecuted against him on Behalf of the King, or any Patent by Grant of the King, may exhibit his Bill against the King's Attorney, and such others as are interested in the Cause, to be reliev'd in Equity: in which Case the Plaintiff must attend the King's Attorney with a Copy of his Bill, and procure him to answer the same, who may confult those who are interested, or any Officer or other, touching the faid Answer, so as the King may not be prejudicd thereby; and his Anfwer is to be put in without Oath. Where an Officer or Minister is one of the Parties in any personal Action, any Man that is a Prisoner to this Court, or an Accountant, or any other that ought to have the like Privilege, shall not be fued in any personal Action, but in this Court; and he that is a Farmer of the Revenue, or indebted to the King, for the King's more speedy Satisfaction, shall sue his Debtor by a Quo Minus in the Exchequer.

### Courts in the Exchequer.

In the Exchequer are seven Courts, namely, the Court of Pleas, the Court of Accounts, the Court of Receipts, the Court of Exchequer Chamber, being the Assembly of all the Judges of England in Matters of Law; the Court of Exchequer Chamber for all Errors in the Court of Exchequer; for Errors

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rors in the King's Bench, and Court of Equity, in the Exchequer Chamber: These are divided into two Parts, one of Law, the other of Equity, in which said Court of Equity, all Persons may have the same Relief as in Chancery. The Lord Chief Baron also sits in the Asternoon, both in Sittings, and after the Term at Westminster, on Trials by Juries, on Informations exhibited by the Officers of the Customs, Salt, &c. both as Informations of Seizures, and Personal ones.

### Barons of the Exchequer.

The Chief Judge of this Court is stiled Lord Chief Baron, and holds his Place by Patent, Quam din le bene gesserit, as the Puisny Barons do. They are thought to be call'd Barons, because the Court of Exchequer was anciently manag'd by noble Barons. The Barons of the Exchequer are the fovereign Auditors of England; for if a Man fign Auditors to a Bailiff, or Receiver, to account, and those Auditors will not allow just and reasonable Allowances, but commit the Bailiff, or Receiver to Prison, fuch Prisoner may have an original Writ, Ex parte talis, returnable before the Treasurer and Barons of the Exchequer for his Relief. The Lord Chief Baron, in Term-time, and in the Sittings out of Term, fit alone in the Afternoon in Guild-Hall, upon Causes which arise in London, and cannot be dispatch'd in the Morning. He causes the Oath to be administer'd to the Lord-Mayor. The Lord Chief Baron, and the three other Barons, have also their Writ of Assistance, summoning them to the Lords House.

### Barons of the Exchequer.

Lord Chief Baron, Sir James Reynolds, Knt. Sir Laurence Carter, Knt. Sir John Comyns, Knt. Sir William Thomson, Knt.

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The Cursitor Baron has no such Writ, nor is an Itinerant Judge. He administers the Oaths to the Sheriffs, Bailiffs, and to Searchers, Surveyors, and other Officers of the Customs. He is call'd, Cursitor Baron, because he has usually been chosen from the most experienc'd Clerks of the two Remembrancers Office, and when the rest of the Barons are upon the Circuit. To this Office are brought all Accounts which pass the Remembrancer's Office, and remain there; that if any stated Debt be due from any Person, the same may be drawn down into the great Roll of the Pipe; and the Comptroller issues out a Writ, call'd, The Summons of the Pipe, for Recovery thereof. In all Courts he pleads within the Bar; but when a Privy Counfellor (which often happens), he cannot plead in any Court, but on the King's Affairs, without obtaining a Privy Seal for so doing. There is no Salary annex'd to this Office, but the Perquisites arising by Patents, Pardons, and Fees for pleading the King's Causes, &c. are so considerable, as to make this Office worth 5000 l. per Annum.

The Sollicitor General hath likewise his Office by Patent, during the King's Pleasure, in whose Gift both these great Offices are. They had anciently a Right

Right to their Writs of Summons, to fit in the Lords House on special Occasions, 'till the 13th of Car. II. since which they have almost constantly been chosen Members of the House of Commons. He hath the same Care and Concern in managing the King's Affairs, and hath Fees for Pleadings, besides other Fees arising by Patents, & The Sollicitor General as well as the Attorney General have their Attendance on the Privy Council, and were anciently always reckon'd among the Officers of the Exchequer, tho' they have Audience and come within the Bar in all other Courts; their Places being in the King's Gift.

Ecclesiastical Courts, and Judges of the Civil-Law.

Court of the Archbishop of Canterbury, so called from the Arch'd Church and Tower of St. Mary le Bow, where they originally held their Sittings. Here Suits between Party and Party, within the Province of Canterbury, are decided. The Dean whereof hath Jurisdiction over a Deanry consisting of thirteen Parishes within London, exempt from the Jurisdiction of the Bishop of London. Hither are likewise directed all Appeals in Spiritual Matters within the said Province of Canterbury. The Advocates in this Court are all Doctors of the Civil Law, and have usually their Residence in Doctors Commons, where the Court is kept.

The Register, who may act by a Deputy, is to attend the Court, and receive all Libels, Bills, Allegations, and Matters exhibited by Witnesses. To file all Sentences, and keep the Records of the Court.

There are 27 Proctors belonging to this Court, who act by exhibiting their Proxies for their Clients, for

for whom they make themselves Parties. They draw up Acts and Pleadings in Causes, manage Evidence, and prepare Causes for Sentence, attending on the Advocates with their Proceedings; and are indeed to Clients, what Attornies and Sollicitors are in the other Courts of Law. They are admitted by the Archbishop's Fiat, and are allowed to practise as soon as they are admitted, and have taken the Oaths.

### Prerogative Court.

Intestate; and is so called, because the Archbishop by his Prerogative, hath Power throughout his whole Province, where the Party at his Death had five Pounds or upwards, in several Dioceses. The like two Courts hath the Archbishop of York. All Citations and Decrees run in the Name of the Archbishop. This Court is kept in the common Hall in the Asternoon, next day after the Arches, The Judge is attended by the Register, who sets down the Decrees and Acts of Court, and keeps Records, &c. All the Places belonging to this Court are in the Gift of the Archbishop.

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# High Court of Admiralty.

Maritime Controversies, Trials of Malesastors for Offences committed at Sea, &c. The Writs and Decrees run all in the Name of the Lord High Admiral, or Lords Commissioners for executing that Office. To this Court belongs an Advocate General to the King, a Register, and Marshal General, who carries a silver Oar before the Judge. The Lord Admiral hath also his Advocate and Proctor; and all other Advocates and Proctors are presented by them, and admitted by the Judge.

# Court of Delegates.

HIS is the highest Court for Civil Affairs that concerns the Church; for the Jurisdiction whereof it was provided, 25 Hen. 8. That it shall be lawful for the Subject, in case of Defect of Justice in the Ecclesiastical Courts, to appeal to the Sovereign in his Courts of Chancery, whence a Commission is directed under the Great Seal to particular Persons therein nominated, for Redress of Judgment; so that from the highest Ecclesiastical Court, there lies no Appeal but to the Court of Delegates; and beyond this, to no other, except the House of Lords. But the King, of his free Will, may grant a Commission of Review under the Great Seal. The Citations run all in the King's Name.

# Dutchy-Court of Lancaster.

THIS Court was anciently a Kind of Chancery Court, for the hearing Matters that occurr'd within the Dutchy; wherein the Chancellor of the Dutchy was Judge: But there was a Restriction, by Stat. 16 Car. II. and it now chiefly takes Cognizance of such Causes as any Way concern the Revenue belonging to the Dutchy. The Chief Judge of the Court is call'd Chancellor of the Dutchy of Lancaster; and is affisted therein by two Judges, an Attorney General, and other proper Officers, both in the Court of the Dutchy-Chamber held at Westminster and that held within the County Palatine of Lancaster, at Preston. In which last he has the Assistance of a Vice-Chancellor, as well as an Attorney General.

# Lord Great Chamberlain of ENGLAND.

THIS Office was anciently enjoy'd by the Earls of Oxford, and so pass'd, with some little Interruption, till the Time of Queen Elizabeth, when by the Marriage of Peregrine Bertie, Lord Willoughby of Eresby, with the Heir General of the [f2] Earls

Earls of Oxford, it became Hereditary in the Family of Bertie, who after some Disputes about the Title, did attain it intirely in the Reign of King Charles I. To this great Office has anciently belong. ed Livery and Lodging in the Royal Court, and certain Fees due from the Archbishops and Bishops when they perform their Homage to the Sovereign: And for all the Peers of the Realm at their Crea tion, or performing Homage. At every Coronation, he claims forty Ells of Crimlon Velvet for his own Robes; and likewise the Bed and all the Furniture of the King's Chamber; he carries the Gloves and Linen us'd by the King at the Coronation; he carries the Sword in Regalla for the Coronation; and has a very hear and particular Attendance on the King's Person the whole Day. He has the Care of providing all Things in the House of Lords during their Sitting: and to this End, has an Apartment hear the House : He has allowthe Government of the whole Palace of Westminster, and iffues his Warrants for furnishing Westminster-Hall against Coronations, and Trials of Peers , and the Gentleman Ulher of the Black Rod, the Yeoman Usher and Door keepers are under his Command; and upon all folemn Occasions, the Keys of Westminster Hall and Court of Requests are delivered. When the King comes to Parliament, he disposes of the Sword of State to some Lord, to be carried before him into the House, and goes himself on the Right Hand of the Sword, and the Earl Marshal, or Deputy, on the Left.

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# Of the Knights of the Bath.

THE Order of the Bath was first instituted at the Coronation of Henry IV. Anno 1399; since which Time it has been customary for Kings and Queens to create Knights at their Coronations, Marriages, Births of Princes, or any other Time of publick Rejoicing. The Habits and Ceremonies of Installation, were originally designed as mystick Significations, which are too numerous to be here inserted; we shall only give an Instance or two, that the Reader may have some Idea of the whole.

The white Girdle represents the Virtue of Chastity, in Opposition to impure and criminal Love, which they ought particularly to detest, as being the avowed Guardians of Female Virtue and Honour.

The Coif, white Covering, and white Hat, import, that they ought to preserve pure Consciences before God, and should be careful never to do, never to design any Thing, for which their Minds may inwardly challenge or reproach them.

The Blow on the Neck is intended as a Memorial to them, that they ought not to be insensible of any real Indignity or Affront; that Honour is a tender Point; and that no Impressions are sooner selt, or ought to be longer retain'd than those whereby any Person suffers in his Character, as a Man of Honour.

# Of the Government of LONDON.

Begin with the Civil Government, of which the Lord Mayor is Chief: A Magistrate yearly choren by the Citizens out of their own Body, upon Michaelmas Day, Sept. 29th, and who enters upon his Office with great Solemnity, upon the 29th of Ottober following.

The City Government is every way answerable to the National: For, as England is govern'd by King, Lords, and Commons; so is the City by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council.

So great is the Lord Mayor of London's Magistracy, that of all the Mayors in England, none but he, and of latter Times the Mayor of York, bear the Title of Lord.

His Authority reaches, not only over the City, and Part of the Suburbs, (except some particular Places) but also on the Thames, as far as the Mouth of it; and Westward, as far as Stanes-Bridge. He is the Chief Judge of London, and has a Power to summon and to imprison.

His House is a Court, and his Table open to all Comers of Quality. He has under him both great and small Officers, and among the first a Sword-Bearer, who has 100 L allowed him yearly for his Table. For his Diversion, he has a Kennel of Hounds

Hounds always maintained, and the Privilege to hunt not only in Middle sex, but also in Surrey and Sussex. On the King's Coronation Day, he claims to be the Chief Butler. And it is observable, that when King fames I. was invited to take Possession of the Crown of England, Robert Lee, then Lord Mayor of London, subscribed in the first Place, before all the Nobility.

When he appears abroad on Horse-back, it is with rich Caparisons, and always in long Robes; sometimes Purple, sometimes Scarlet, with a great Chain of Gold, and a rich Jewel to it, hanging from his Neck downwards; he is also attended by several Officers, walking before, and on both Sides of him. But the Greatness of this Magistrate, upon his Installation Day, is beyond any Thing of this Nature elsewhere.

For the better Government of the City, it is divided into 26 Wards, and there is an Alderman assigned to every Ward. These 26 Aldermen are next to the Lord Mayor in Power and Dignity, and each has under him a certain Number of Common Council-Men, one of them his Deputy, besides Under-Officers. By the City Charter, the Aldermen that have been Lord Mayors, and the three eldest next to them, are Justices of the Peace of the City. Upon an Alderman's Decease, the Lord Mayor issues out his Precept to the Ward of, which he was Alderman, to chuse two substantial Men of the City, and return their Names to the Court of Aldermen; which being done, the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen elect one of the two, such as they think fittest for that Station.

There is also a Recorder, who is an Assistant to the Lord Mayor, as to the Laws and Customs of the City, in which he ought to be well versed. His Place in Councils, and in Court, is before any Alderman that has not been Mayor. It is the Recorder that delivers the Sentence of the Court. [51]

The two Sheriffs of London and Middlesex are also considerable Magistrates, especially in their Power to impanel Juries. They are yearly chosen at Guild-Hall on Midsummer Day, by the Livery-men; but not sworn till Michaelmas Eve, when they enter upon their Office. And if either of them resuse to hold, he is liable to the Penalty of 4201. unless he takes his Oath, that he is not worth 100001. Each Sheriff has under him an Under-Sheriff, six Clerks, a certain Number of Serjeants, and every Serjeant a Yeoman. The Under-Sheriffs have also Clerks under them.

Clerks under them. Lastly, There is a Chamberlain, an Officer of great Trust, being intrusted with the City Cash, and the Orphans Money. Therefore when he takes his Office upon him, he must give good Security to the Court of Aldermen, and is accountable to Auditors appointed to examine his Accounts. Part of his Office does also relate to Apprentices, over whom he has a great Authority. None can be bound without his Licence, nor can any Man fet up Shop, or follow his Trade, without being sworn before him. If an Apprentice proves disorderly, or has committed any great Offence, Mr. Chamberlain, upon Complaint made thereof, and the Fact proved, may fend him to Bridewell, or punish him otherwise, according to the Nature of the Offence. And if a Master misuse his Apprentice, he may relieve him, or leave him to take his Remedy against his Master in the Lord Mayor's Court. Mr. Chamberlain may also make an Apprentice Free, if his Master resuse to do it, when his Indenture is expired: But if his Master combines with his Apprentice to make him Free, before he has ferved him the full Term of feven Years, upon Proof thereof, they may be both fined at the Pleasure of Mr. Recorder.

As to the City-Courts, most of them held in Guild-Hall, I shall begin with the Common Council, which is the City-Parliament, confisting of two Orders, viz. Lord Mayor and Aldermen, representing the House of Lords, and the Common Council-Men, which represent the House of Commons. These last are in all 234, belonging to their respective Wards, of which some have more, some less. In this Court all By-laws are made which bind all the Citizens. A Stranger may be made free of London by this Court, and not otherwise. For the Dispatch of City Affairs, this Court appoints Committees, who make their Report as Occasion requires. By this Court the Commissioners for the Sewers and Pavements, a Governor, Deputy Governor, and Affistants for the Management of the City Lands in Ulster in Ireland, the Garbler, Coroner, Bailiff of Southwark, Common Serjeant, Town-Clerk, and Common Crier, are annually elected.

The Court of the Lord Mayor is a Court of Record, held in the Chamber of Guild-Hall, where all Actions may be entred and tried by a Jury as in other Courts, for Debt, Trespass, &c. arising within the Liberties of London, and to any Value. The Recorder is the proper Judge of this Court, to which belong four Attornies and fix Serjeants at Mace; one of these constantly attending at the Lord Mayor's House, and the rest at the Attorney's Offices. Tuesday is the Day for Trials. The Charge of entering an Action is but 4d. besides the King's Duty. It may be brought to a Trial for 30 s. Charge, and in 14 Days Time. An Action entred here remains in Force for ever, tho' no Proceedings be had thereupon: Whereas it dies in the Compters, and may be croffed after 16 Weeks.

The Court of Aldermen is also a Court of Record, held in the Inner Chamber every Tuesday and Thursday, except Holy Days, and in the Time of Sessions of Gaol-Delivery. This Court does constantly

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stantly appoint the Assize of Bread, and determines all Matters touching Lights, Water-Courses, and Party-Walls. Here must be sealed all Bonds and Leases, that pass under the City Seal: And by this Court the Rulers of the Company of Watermen,

are annually elected and appointed.

The Hustings is a most ancient Court of Record, always held in Guild-Hall, before the Lord Mayor and Sheriffs, the Recorder sitting as Judge with them. Here Deeds may be enrolled, Recoveries passed, Wills proved, and Outlawries sued out, Replevins, and Writs of Error, &c. determined. In this Court also is made the Election of the four Citizens of London, to be the Representatives of the City in Parliament.

The Court of Gaol-Delivery is usually held eight times a Year at the Old Bailey, for the Trial of Malefactors in the County of Middlesex. The Lord Mayor is the Chief Judge of this Court, assisted by some of the Judges, the Recorder, and the two

Sheriffs.

The Two Sheriffs Courts, held in Guild-Hall, the one by one Sheriff, every Wednesday and Friday, for Actions entred at Woodstreet Compter; the other, by the other Sheriff, every Thur/day and Saturday, for Actions entred at the Poultry Compter. In these Courts may be tried Actions of Debt, Case, Trespass, Account, and Covenants broken, Attachments, and Sequestrations. And if either Party shall have a Witness that cannot stay in London till the Day of Tryal, his Testimony taken in Writing will be allowed as good Evidence. To these Courts belong eight Attornies, whose Office is only to affist their Clients. Two Secondaries, who allow and return all Writs brought to remove all Causes out of these Courts. Two Clerks of the Papers, who draw the Subpanas, for Witnesses to appear, file and copy all Declarations upon Actions in these Courts. Two Prothonotaries who draw and engross

all fuch Declarations. Eight Clerk-Sitters, who enter Actions and Attachments, and take Bails and Verdicts.

The Chamberlain's Court, or Office, kept in the Chamber of Guild-Hall, where he attends commonly every Forenoon, to inroll and turn over Apprentices, and to make such Free as have duly served the full Term of seven Years, and have not married, nor

taken Wages in that Time.

The Court of Conscience, or Request, erected by Act of Parliament in the Reign of King James I. both for the Relief of poor Debtors that cannot make present Payments of their Debts under 40 s. and of poor Persons having small Debts owing to them, but not able to sue for them. This Court sits in Guild-Hall every Wednesday and Saturday in the Forenoon, and consists of two Aldermen and four Commoners, monthly appointed by the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen. But any three of them make a Court.

The Orphans Court, held before the Lord Mayor and Aldermen who are Guardians to the Children of all Freemen of London, that are, or shall be under the Age of 21 Years, at the Time of their Father's Decease. This Court meets but once a Year, viz. at Guild-Hall, on the Monday Morning after Mid-Lent Sunday, which is termed Call-Day. The Chamber of London was always counted the best Security, till in the Reign of King Charles the Second, the Orphans Money (among others) being lent to the King, was shut up in the Exchequer, neither Principal nor Interest being paid in that, nor the following Reign. Whereas before this Money was lent, when Orphans came to Age, or were married with the Consent and Approbation of the Court of Aldermen, they might at an Hours Notice receive their Portions, if paid into the Chamber, Mr. Chamberlain and his Clerks attending daily for that Purpofe. The Use-Money was likewise duly paid.

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At last, for Relief of the Orphans, and the other Creditors of the City of London, an Act was made in the late King and Queen's Reign, which settled a perpetual Fund to pay to the said Orphans, and the other Creditors, the yearly Interest of 4 per Center principal Money. Towards which the City, is charged with the annual Sum of 8000 t for ever, to be raised

and paid out of the City's Revenues.

The Court for the Conservation of the Thames, held before the Lord Mayor, at such Times as he appoints, within the adjacent Counties to London and Westminster. The Water Bailist, being the London Mayor's Deputy in this Case, ought, by his Office, to give his Lordship Notice of all Offences committed by any Persons, contrary to the Orders made for the Preservation of the Brood and Fry of Fishin the said River. The Punishment whereof is in the Power of the Lord Mayor and has been so Time out of Mind.

The Pie-powder-Court, held every Hour during the first three Days of Bartholomew Fair, by Stewards appointed by the Lord Mayor and Court of Aldermen. Here are tried all Suits for petty Matters and Offences there committed, contrary to the Proclamation made on Bartholomew Eve in the Asternoon, for the better regulating this Fair. In this Court Justice ought to be summarily adminstred within three Floods and Ebbs of the Tide in the River Thames.

Besides the Courts aforesaid, every Alderman keeps a Court in his Ward, call'd a Wardmote, for Things relating to his Ward; particularly for the Election of Common Council-Men, and other Officers: For which the Lord Mayor issues out yearly his Precept to every Alderman to hold his Wardmote.

The Traders Companies have also their Courts, called Hall-motes, from their respective Halls; where they meet once a Month, to regulate what belongs to their several Trades.

From the Civil Government of London, I proceed to the Military. This City being by Charter a County Corporate, and a Lieutenancy of itself, the Power of a Lord Lieutenant is in the Lord Mayor and Aldermen; with other principal Members of the City, commisfioned from the King to act as his Lieutenants in London, and order the City Militia with the same Power that other Lord Lieutenants have in their respective Counties.

Which Militia consists of fix Regiments of Foot, making about 9000 Men, besides two Regiments of the Hamlets of the Tower, and the Regiment of South-

wark.

Laftly, In Church-Matters, this City is governed in chief by the Lord Bishop of London; to whom is committed the Care of the whole Clergy of this Place: For whose Maintenance there is in most Parishes, a Parsonage, or a Vicarage-House, with a competent Allowance; besides the Profits of Christenings, Marriages and Burials. As to those Parishes whose Churches were destroy'd by the dismal Fire in 1666, no Parson thereof is to have less than 100 l. and none above 200; but most have between 100 and 1501. Which, in lieu of Tithes, is raised by rating the Houses and Shops therein proportionably to their respective Rents. But where-ever there is, either in City or Suburbs, a Lecturer and a Reader, besides the Incumbent, they have their Maintenance by a voluntary Contribution from the Parishioners.

THE Civil Government of the City and Liberty of Westminster, by several antient Charters and Grants from the Crown, is vested in the Dean and Chapter of Westminster; but the Management of their Authority since the Resormation, has been put into the Hands of Laymen, chosen or confirm'd by the Dean and Chapter, or the High Steward or his Deputy.

By an Act of 27 Eliz. for the good Government of the City and Borough of Westminster, 12 Burgesses, and 12 Assistants, were directed to be yearly chosen by the Dean, or the High Steward, or his Deputy, who have Power by that Act to punish according to the Laws of the Realm, or laudable and lawful Custom of the City of London, all Matters of Incontinencies, Common Scolds, and of Inmates and common Annoyances, and have Power to commit Offenders to Prison; and the Burgesses and Assistants in their respective Wards, have the like Powers as Aldermens Deputies in London have.

By feveral Acts of Parliament since made for erecting Parishes, and building Parish-Churches, the Number of Burgesses has been increased to sixteen, and the like Number of Assistants.

There are Courts-Leet, and likewise Burgess-Courts; at the Courts-Leet they swear the Leet Juries, Constables, Headboroughs, and other Leet Officers,

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Officers, and do the other Business of Courts-Leet; and the Burgesses, with the Dean and Chapter, High Steward, or Deputy Steward, act according to the several Powers given them by the beforemention'd Act of 27 Eliz.

Right Honourable Charles Earl of Arran is the present High Steward, appointed by the Dean and Chapter of Westminster, and holds his Office for Life.

High-Bailiff, David Patton, Esq;

The High Bailiff is in the Nature of a Sheriff, has the Power of executing and returning all Writs, and Process, impanelling Juries, as well for the Courts-Leet and Burgess-Courts, as the Grand and Petty Juries for the Quarter Sessions at Westminster. He is the returning Officer in Westminster for electing Members of Parliament; all Fines and Forseitures for Offences committed in Westminster, belong to him. He is appointed by the Dean and Chapter, and holds his Office for Life.
