## $\mathbf{A} \ \mathbf{C} \ \mathbf{T}$

In Favours of the Town of GLASGOW, for Two Pennies Scots upon the Pint of all Ale and Beer to be either browen, vended, or fold, within the faid Burgh, and Privileges thereof.

A T Edinburgh, the twenty-one day of September, one thousand seven hundred and five years. Our Sovereign Lady, the Queen's Majesty, and the Estates of Parliament, taking into their confideration, that notwithstanding of a former act of Parliament, made and passed in favours of the town of Glasgow, upon the fifteenth of June, one thousand fix hundred and ninety-three, for the better payment of their debts and burdens, Their Majesties, King William and Queen Mary, did thereby grant and dispone to the said town of Glasgow, and community thereof, the impofition of two pennies Scots upon the pint of all ale and beer to be vended and fold within the faid town, and liberties thereof, ordaining the same to be paid to the said town and Magistrates and Council thereof, during such space of years as should please Their said Majesties to appoint, not exceeding the number of thirteen years after the first of November the said year, as the faid act of Parliament of the date foresaid

foresaid more fully bears; and that, in purfuance thereof, the faid King William, by His letter direct to the Lords of Privy Council, upon the twenty-ninth of August, one thoufand fix hundred and ninety-three years, was pleased to declare, That it was His royal will and pleasure, that the foresaid imposition should continue and endure to the faid town the haill foresaid space of thirteen years, as if the famen had been therein absolutely set down; yet nevertheless, the said thirteen years, whereof there remains only one year to run after the first of November next, neither have been nor are like to be sufficient for payment of the faids towns debts and burdens, and fatisfying the end for which the gift thereof was granted, which happened partly through the great quantity of the debt wherein the faid town flood then engaged, and partly through the payments wherewith the faid gift was burdened; as also, by reason of many other incidents, which diminished the said fund, and the town's other publick good, and augmented the town's charges and expences, fo that confiderable fums were to be borrowed yearly for defraying what the common good of the town was deficient in: And Her Majesty, and the Estates of Parliament, being still willing, in regard of the loyalty and good affection of the faid burgh witneffed on all occafions, that the foresaid town of Glasgow be relieved

relieved and difburdened of its debts for its necessary support; therefore Her Majesty, with advice and confent of the Estates of Parliament, doth hereby further add, grant, and difpone, to the faid town of Glasgow, and community thereof, and to the faid Magistrates and Town Council of the same, and their fuccessors in office, for their use and behove, the faid imposition of two pennies Scots money, over and above the Queen's annexed excise, upon the pint of all ale and beer to be either browen, or in-brought, vended, topped, and fold, within the faid town and liberties, and fuburbs thereof, excepting all ale and beer that shall be browen and vended in the Gorbels, or any other lands within the town's privileges that pays excise with the shire; imposing and ordaining the same to be payed to the faid town and Magistrates and Council thereof by the brewers, vintners, fellers, or toppers, of the faid ale and beer during the space of fixteen years, beginning this new imposition from the ish and expiration of the said former imposition; that is, from and after the first day of November, one thousand seven hundred and fix, and fo furth to continue during the whole years and time hereby added, and to be payed, uplifted, and gathered weekly, monthly, quarterly, or otherways, as the foresaid Magistrates and Town Council shall think fit to prescribe and order: Providing al-A 2

ways, likeas it is hereby specially provided, That, betwixt and the first day of November next, the Magistrates and Town Council of the faid burgh of Glasgow shall be holden and obliged to make up a just and true list of the principal fums due by the faid town of Glafgow preceeding the date hereof, and of the bonds granted therefore, and of the perfons to whom the fame is due, and that they shall deliver an subscribed double of the said lift, to be recorded in the books of the Merchants' House of the said burgh, and another subscribed double of the faid lift, to be recorded in the books of the Trades' House, in order to the faid respective houses their taking tryal of the extent, verity, and justness of the saids debts, in fuch manner, and by fuch persons, as shall be appointed by them for that effect: And that how foon any advantage shall arise to the faid burgh by the above imposition now granted in their favours, that then, and immediately after the expiration of each year thereof, at least, betwixt and the first day of January after the faid expiration, the faids Magiftrates and Town Council shall be holden and obliged to make payment and difburden the faid town of the principal fums following, out of the first end of the debts contained in the above lists, viz. Of the sum of ten thoufand merks yearly, for the first five years of the faid imposition; and of the sum of twelve thousand

thousand merks yearly, for the next five years thereof; and of the sum of fourteen thousand merks yearly, betwixt and the faid first day of January after the expiration of each year, during the remanent years of this grant and imposition; and that the said Magistrates shall be holden and obliged to instruct the said payment, and to retire and deliver bonds for the faid respective sums, to be yearly payed as aforesaid, to the said two Houses against the first Tuesday of January yearly, after expiration of every year's collection of the faid two pennies, that the faid bonds may be cancelled and deleted out of the above respective lists of debts, beginning the first term's instruction of the faid payment to the faid Houses on the first Tuesday of January, one thousand seven hundred and eight years, for the year preceeding November, one thousand seven hundred and seven years, and so furth to continue during the haill space of the above act: As also it is hereby statute and ordained, That it shall not be lawful for, nor in the power of, the Magistrates or Town Council of Glasgow, to contract any debts, or to grant any bonds, for affecting the faid burgh without confent of the faid two Houses had and obtained thereto. by their act to be recorded in their respective books, and that only for the fums contained in the lift of debts recorded in the registers of both Houses, and that there shall be publick intimation

intimation given to the haill Merchants and Trades of Glasgow, whether members of the faid respective Houses or not, to be present at the faid annual meeting, upon the faid first Tuesday of January yearly, in order to their fatisfaction anent the payment of the yearly fums above appointed; and that it shall be leisum and lawful to the said two Houses, or any persons to be appointed by them, or any other burgefs, to purfue the Magistrates and Town Council in case of their not observing of the above conditions, who are hereby declared lyable in repetition and payment of whatever part of the above respective sums appointed to be payed yearly as aforefaid shall be unpayed by them. And nominat and appoint the Duke of Hamilton, the Marquiss of Montrose, the Earl of Glasgow, William Baillie of Lamingtoun, Hugh Montgomery of Busbie, John Grahame of Dougalstoun, Colin Campbell of Woodside, and John Walkinshaw of Burrowfield, to be overseers of the faid new imposition, and management thereof, three of the faid overfeers being always a quorum: And it is hereby declared, That the faid Magistrates and Town Council shall farm and set in tack the said imposition by way of a publick roup, at fight of the above overfeers, or any three of them, not exceeding the space of three years together: As also it is hereby farder declared, That this imposition

is granted with the burden of the payment to Mr. James Anderson writer to Her Majesty's signet, of the sum of three thousand six hundred pounds Scots money, to be payed in the sirst year of the said imposition, for enabling him to print and carry on An account of the ancient charters and seals of this kingdom before King James the First, according to the characters in the original writs.
