EXTRACT ACT of PARLIAMENT

IN FAVOURS O

The Town of Glafgow.

KING WILLIAM AND MARY'S ACT, 1693.

TT Edinburgh, the fifteenth day of June, one thousand fix hundred and ninetythree years. The which day our Soveraigne Lord and Lady the King and Queen's Majesties, and the Estates of Parliament, taking to their confideration the great debts and bur-thens of the town of Glasgow, occasioned by the malversation of the former Magistrates, whereby that once flourishing place is like to be brought to outer ruine; and Their Majesties and the Estates of Parliament being willing, in regard of the loyaltie and good affection of the said burgh, witnessed on all occasions since the late happy Revolution, that the foresaid town of Glasgow be relieved, and the debts payed in the easiest and most effectual manner; therefore Their Majesties, with advice and consent of the saids Estates of Parliament, do hereby give, grant, and dispone to the said town of Glasgow, and community thereof, and the faids Magistrates and Town Councill of the same, and their successors in office, for

their use and behove, the imposition of the two pennies Scots, over and above the King's annexed excyse and additional excise, impofed in this fession of Parliament, upon the pynte of all ale and beere to be either browen, or in-brought and vended, topped or fold, within the faid town and fuburbs, and liberties thereof, imposing and ordaining the same to be payed to the said town and Magistrates and Councill thereof above mentioned, by the brewers, vintners, fellers, or toppers of the faid ale and beere, and that during fuch space of years as it shall please Their Majesties to appoint, not exceeding the number of thirteen years, as ane just space and time calculate for payment and discharge of the town's debt, beginning the faid impolition from the first day of November next to come, and so forth to continue during the whole years and time above mentioned, and to be payed, uplifted, and gathered weekly, monthly, quarterly, or otherwise, as the forefaids Magistrates and Town Councill shall think fit to prescribe and order, excepting only from this act all ale and beere that shall be browen in the countrey, without the liberties of the burgh, by heritors in their own lands, and in-brought by them, they inhabiting for the time within the town, to be confumed for the use of themselves and their familys allenerly, and also excepting all ale and beere that shall be browen and vended 3

in the Garballs, or any other lands within the town's priviledges that pays excise with the shires: And it is hereby declared, That the faids Magistrates and Town Councill of the faid burgh shall farme and sett in tack the faid imposition by way of publick roup, att the fight and by the advice of the Sherriff of the shire of Lanark, and Baillie or Baillie-deputes of the regality of Glasgow, and the first Commissioner of the shire of Lanark, and the sirst Commissioner of the shire of Renfrew, to the best advantage, for as many years and termes as shall be agreed to; providing always, that the forefaid imposition be applyed, lykeas it is hereby most strictly destinated, appointed, and applyed, for the payment of the faid town's debt allready contracted, and for no other uses or ends; and in this manner, viz. for payment as well of the annual rent of the faids debts as the principall fum for the space of the first three years of the said years to be appointed by Their Majesties, and thereafter for payment of the principall fums of the faid debts allenerly, the annuall rent of the fubsequent years being payed, likeas Their Majesties, with confent foresaid, hereby ordain the same to be payed out of the common good and other revenues of the faid town; certifying lykeas Their Majesties, with consent foresaid, do hereby certify and ordain, That all Magistrates of the faid burgh, or others misapplying the forfaid

faid imposition to any other use or end, as also all the receivers of the said imposition so misapplyed, that they shall be liable to make furthcoming and refound the famen, with the interest, to the creditors of the said town, and that at the instance either of the said creditors, or of any burgess within the said burgh: And to the effect it may be certainly known both what the faid imposition shall amount to, and that the same is duly applyed in manner foresaid, Their Majesties, with consent foresaid, doe ordaine the said town, and Magistrates and Councill thereof, to keep distinct books of the faid imposition, both of charge and discharge, and to make the same patent to all; and further, Their Majesties, with confent foresaid, doe hereby impower the Sherriff of the shire of Lanark, and the Baillie or Baillie-depute of the regality of Glasgow, the first Commissioner of the shire of Lanark, and the first Commissioner of the shire of Renfrew, to inspect the saids book of accompts; and, in case of misapplication or malversation, to comptroll the same, and make the misapplyers or malversers lyable in manner forefaid: And further, it is provided, That if any ale or beere browen in the countrey, without the liberties of the faid burgh, and not above excepted, shall be found to be brought into the faid burgh, and liberties, thereof, without paying the foresaid imposition, tion, it shall be lawful seizure, both cask and liquor, to be declared by the faids Magistrates; and it is hereby declared. That the faid Magistrates and Councill are to have and use such like execution and diligence for collecting and ingathering the foresaid imposition, as they have and use for the common good and revenues thereof, impowering them hereby fully for thatend, and to cognosce and determine thereanent, and anent all other questions and debates that may arise in the faid matter betwixt the collectors and taxmen and the faids brewers, vintners, and topfters, and others, as accords; and it is hereby declared, That this imposition is granted to the faid burgh with the burden of payment, in the first place, to William Andersone, fon to the deceast William Anderson late Provost of Glasgow, of the sum of nyne thoufand merks Scots money, to be payed in the space of three years, and that notwithstanding of any discharge granted thereof, or paction for granting the same; and it is likeways declared. That this imposition is burthened with the Magistrates of the said burgh, their furnishing of a sufficient tollbooth for receiving and detaining fuch persons as shall be fent to them by the Baillie of the regality of Glasgow, or his depute, and for holding of his courts therein.
