## GEORGII II. Regis!

An Act for granting to His Majesty an additional Duty on foreign Cambricks, imported into Great Britain; and for allowing thereout a Bounty upon certain Species of British and Irish Linens exported.

Linens, made in the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, are greatly improved and increased, whereby the Price of Linens, as well of foreign as home Fabrick, hath been considerably reduced; and whereas the further Extension of the said Manufactures of Linens will be a great Advantage to the said Kingdoms; therefore we Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Great Britain in Parliament assembled, do give and grant to Your Majesty, Your Heirs, and Successors, such additional Duty upon foreign Cambricks, to be imported into Great Britain, as is herein after mentioned; and do most humbly beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That, out of the said additional Duty on foreign Cambricks, there Irish Linens. shall be given and paid, without any Fee, Reward or Deduction whatsoever, a Bounty of One Penny, for every Yard of British and Irish Linens made of Hemp or Flax, of the Value of Six Pence per Yard, and not exceeding the Value of Twelve Pence per Yard,

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and of one Halfpenny for every Yard of fuch British and Irish Linens under the Value of Six Pence per Yard; which from and after the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thoufand seven hundred and forty three, and within the Term of Seven Years, to commence from the faid Twenty fifth Day of March, or at any Time thereafter, before the End of the then next Session of Parliament, shall be exported out of Great Britain, to Africa, America, or Portugal, or which shall be exported to Spain, from and after the Time that it shall be lawful to export such Linens to that Kingdom.

3. Provided always, That the Exporter of Manner of

fuch British and Irish Linens shall, in his entering British and Irish Entry thereof, express the Quantity and Va-Linens for lue; and likewise endorse on the Cocquet, Exportation. granted upon such Entry, the true Quantity and Value of the said Linens intended to be shipt; and moreover, shall, before he receives any fuch Bounty, produce a Certificate from the Searcher, or other proper Officer appointed to see the same shipped, verifying the shipping thereof; and shall likeways give sufficient Security to the Collector or Customer of the Port, in the Penalty of double the Value of the Goods intended to be exported, and One hundred Pounds, which Security they are hereby impowered to take in the Name, and to the Use of His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, that such Linen so. shipped, or intended to be shipped, or any Part thereof, shall not be relanded, or brought

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on shore again in any Port or Part of Great Britain, Ireland, or the Isle of Man; and shall also, before he receives any such Bounty, make Oath, or, being a Quaker, a solemn Affirmation (which Oath or Affirmation the proper Officers of the Customs have hereby Power to administer) of the respective Values of fuch Linens, upon which the faid Bounties respectively are granted, and that the same were made in Great Britain or Ireland.

4. And to prevent Linens exceeding the Value of Twelve Pence per Yard being exported for sake of the said Bounty, be it further enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, Directions to That the Collector and Comptroller, or theofficers of other proper Officers of the Customs may the Customs, open, view, and examine any or all fuch Linens as shall be entered at the Value of Twelve Pence per Yard or under, and compare the same with the Value and Price thereof sworn to, or affirmed in the Entry and Endorsement on the Cocquet; and if, upon such View and Examination, it shall appear that such Linen is of greater Value than Twelve Pence per Yard, then, and in fuch Case, the Exporter or Proprietor shall, on Demand made in Writing by the Customer, or Collector and Comptroller of the Port where fuch Goods or Merchandizes are entered, deliver, or cause to be delivered, all such Goods and Merchandizes into His Majesty's Warehouse at the Port of Exportation, for the Use and Benefit of the Crown; and, upon such Delivery, the Customer or

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Collector of fuch Port, with the Privity of the Comptroller, shall, out of any Money in the Hands of such Customer or Collector, arising by Customs, or other Duties belonging to the Crown, pay to fuch Importer or Proprietor the Value of Thirteen Pence per Yard, taking a Receipt for the same, from fuch Exporter or Proprietor, in full Satisfaction for the faid Goods, as if they had been regularly fold; and the respective Commissioners of the Customs shall cause the faid Goods to be fairly and publickly fold for the best Advantage; and out of the Produce thereof, the Money fo paid, or advanced as aforesaid, shall be repaid to such Customer or Collector, with the Privity of the Comptroller, to be replaced to fuch Funds from whence the same was borrowed; and the Overplus, if any, shall be paid into His Majesty's Exchequer towards the Sinking Fund, by the Title of The additional Duty an Cambricks granted by this Act.

5. And in order to prevent Abuses by exporting Linens which shall be under the Value of Six Pence per Yard, when the Merchant shall in his Entry and Endorsement on his Cocquet express that the Value thereof is Six Pence per Yard or upwards, in order fraudulently to obtain a Bounty of One Penny instead of a Halfpenny per Yard; be Farther Diit further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, rections to That it shall and may be lawful to and for any Searcher, or other proper Officer, after the Entry of any of the faid Goods, and be-

and strictly examine any Bale, Truss, Chest, or other Package, to see if the Goods are right entered, and endorsed on the Cocquet; and if, on such Examination, the same shall be found to be right entered and endorsed, the Searcher shall, at his own Charge, cause the same to be repacked, which Charge shall be allowed to the faid Officer by the Commissioners of the Customs, if they think it reasonable; but in case the Officer shall, on Examination, find such Goods to be less in Quantity than shall be expressed in the Endorsement in the Merchant's Entry or Cocquet, or under the Value of Six Pence per Yard, or that the Goods shall be entered and endorsed under a wrong Denomination, whereby His Majesty would have been defrauded, all the Goods contained in all and every the Package or Packages endorsed on the faid Entry or Cocquet may be feized, and the same shall be forfeited and lost, and the Owner or Merchant shall lose the Benefit of receiving the Bounty for fuch Goods.

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7. Provided always, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend, or be construed to extend to give any Bounty on any Linens that are striped or chequered, or made into Buckrums or Tilletings.

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Money so certified; and if they have not fufficient to pay such Sum or Sums of Money, they shall forthwith, without Fee or Reward, give fuch Exporter a Certificate, certifying the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs at London; which respective Certificates being affixed to the Debentures for the Bounty of the faid Linens fo exported, and being produced to the faid Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs at London, they the faid Commissioners are hereby authorized and required, on Demand, by the Person authorized as aforesaid, that shall bring the same, to cause the Monies, thereby due to be paid by the Receiver-general, or Cashier of the Customs, without Fee or Reward, out of fuch Monies as shall be in his Hands, arifing out of the Duties hereby granted for the Payment of the faid Bounty; and in case such Receiver or Cashier shall not have Money in his Hands fufficient for paying the whole of fuch Sum or Sums of Money so certified as aforesaid, he is hereby authorized and required to pay, the same, so far as the Money in his Hands will then go, and the Remainder from time to time, as the Money arising by the Duties granted by virtue of this Act shall be by him received; and he is also hereby required to observe a due Course of paying such Debentures, in the Order of Time which they shall be produced or presented to the Commissioners of the Customs, who shall cause such Debentures to be numbered progressively, as
