From the account of the net produce of all the permanent taxes in the year ending the 10th of October, 1796, laid on the table of the House of Commons, it appears that the receipt of the old taxes amounts, besides fractions, to 12,798,326l. the same taxes produced in 1792, 14,284,295l.—the deficiency, therefore, in consequence of the War, is 1,485,969l. The produce of the taxes of the years 1791—4—5, is 2,488,267l.—they were calculated in the different Budgets to produce 2,842,000l.—the deficiency, therefore, amounts to 353,733l.

For the service of the year 1796, provision was to have been made by taxes for the receipt of 1,678,000l. there has been actually received 215,772l. the deficiency amounts, therefore, to 1,462,228l.
