Note.—From the manner in which the importations from the countries within the limits of the East India Company's Charter are brought to account in the books of the Customs, the half-yearly periods cannot be distinguished; nor can any account whatever be as yet rendered of the East India Imports for the half year ending the 5th of July 1796. The Inspector General, for these reasons, has, in order to preserve the Comparative View, omitted, in all the three periods of the above account, the value of the Importations from India and China, which, in the year 1795, amounted to L. 5,766,795, agreeable to the estimates or rates of value in his office.

The principal Importations from the West Indies, and almost the whole Importations from Canada and the Baltic, are made in the half year ending at Christmas: the value, therefore, of the Imports of that period, will always be found greatly to exceed those of the half year ending at Midsummer.

The large excess of the value of the Exports in the half year ending at Christmas, over the half year ending at Midsummer, in a great measure arises from the West India products, such as sugar, coffee, cocoa, &c. being chiefly exported from this country in the Christmas quarter.
