PARLIAMENTARY INTELLIGENCE.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, WEDNESDAY, APRIL 25. The House having resolved itself into a Committee of Supply.

The Secretary at War presented several accounts respecting the Army Estimates; and upon the reading of that part which related to the Volunteer Cavalry.

General Trollope rose to express his wish that those corps might be put in the best possible state of discipline, for which purpose he would recommend the sending detachments of them to the nearest regiments of cavalry, in order to be trained by them.

Mr. Dundas said, that from the best information he could obtain in this subject, it did not appear that those troops were in that undisciplined state alluded to by the Hon. Gentleman.

Mr. Pitt observed, that the corps which the Hon. General had seen without being mounted must have been some of the Supplementary Cavalry, in the vicinity of Bonhill.
