In other books are to be stated the names of persons, whose Income from Lands, Trade, &c. arises out of the district, or who claim deduction for payments to bersons residing out of the district, with a description of the Income so arising out of the district where they return their statement; and, if such statements be considered imperfect, the parties may be required to amen the same, till a perfect statement is delivered, which statements to be open to the inspection of any In spectors or Surveyors, duly sworn according to the directions of the Act.

In order to facilitate inquiry into the state of in ome mentioned to arise out of the district of the Commissioners, they shall transmit the state ment of the party respecting it to the Commissioners or Taxes, who shall send it to be inquired into by the inspectors and surveyors of the districts when t is stated to arise. The inspectors to inquire ac ordingly into the state of such income, or deducions claimed, and then certify the amount of such particulars respectively to the Commissioners of Taxes, to be by them again remitted to the Commercial Commissioners, to whom the statement was originally given. If the Inspectors are not satisfied as to these particulars, the inquiry is to be carried only to the Commercial Commissioners of the districts where the income arises, and the deductions allowed by the act are not to be given unless the payments for which they are allowed, make part of the Income of the persons to whom made, and chargeable as such, unless in the care of Trustee.
