THIS Account is properly stated and vouched. The Superintendent Magistrate was examined upon Oath; he declared, that the Account is just and true in

every Particular. The Number of the Watchmen is regularly kept full with efficient Men, agreeable to the Augmentation of the last Year, which has necessarily increased the Expense very considerably. The Licenses to Pawnbrokers, which have been raifed from Ten to an Hundred Pounds each, have been very productive, as many have continued at the high License to get off their Goods on Hand. The Estimate of last Year was, that Thirty Persons would take out Licenses at an Hundred Pounds each, whereas Forty-four have done it this Year. It is intended to continue the Augmentation of the Watchmen fo long in the Spring as this Surplus Fund shall last. It is probable there will be a confiderable Reduction in the Carriage Duty, on account of the high Price of Hay and Oats; however, he confiders the Funds will continue fufficient for the Purposes of his Establishment. The late Lord Mayor also declared, that he reviewed the Watchmen a few Days before he went out of Office; the Returns were full, the Men appeared well armed and cloathed; he examined the Constables, who gave him satisfactory Accounts relative to the Men and their Conduct, and the Whole appeared to him to be well appointed, complete in Numbers, and in good Order.

THIS Account is properly stated and vouched. The Vice President and the Secretary were examined upon Oath; they declared, that the Account is just and

true in every Particular. The Number of Students educated in the Seminary during the last Year, was One hundred and Fourteen upon an Average; and their Expenses were within the Estimate laid before Parliament. The Buildings are nearly completed; and the Trustees are indebted upon that Head to the Artificers, in the Sum of One thousand Three hundred and Eighty-two Pounds Two Shillings and Two Pence; which arose from the increased Price of Materials and Workmanship, between the Periods of forming the Estimates and executing the Works, and from fome indifpensable Works, such as Sewers, Grates, &c. which were not included in the original Estimates. This Institution appears well attended to; and fince its Commencement in November One Thousand Seven hundred and Ninety-five, there have been Sixty-two Persons fully educated in the College, who are now usefully employed in various Parts of the Country.
