In the year ending 10<sup>th</sup> October 1795 it is further to be observed that there was little more than half a year duty collected on Home and Foreign Spirits 1795. If the first half year had produced as much as the second the additional receipt of that year would have been £91,000 so that the Deficiency arising from the comparison of the two years would be in the year ending 5<sup>th</sup> July 1796 £203,906. This would leave the totals of Charge & Receipt
