The Inspector General thinks it necessary to annex the following Explanatory Note of the Mode by which the above Rates per Centum are obtained:—

THE Quantities Exported to every Part of the World, with the Declared Values by the Merchants Exporters, are extracted from the Bills of Entry, and upon the same Quantities the Values are cast agreeably to the ancient Rates, by which the Manufactures of this Kingdom exported have been estimated in the Books of the Inspector General for upwards of a Century past; from whence it will appear in what Proportion the Value, as now stated by the Declaration of the Exporter, differs from the estimated Value on which the Accounts have been heretofore ascertained.

By thus extracking the Entries of the Quantity and Declared Value exported to every Country, the true Average Value is afcertained, particularly on those Articles which, though classed under One General Head, vary materially in the conflituent Parts in Quality and Price, such as in Wrought Iron, from the finest Article of pot lished Steel to the Ploughshare, &c.
